Lots of us have found that out over here; and believe me, it's going to make us different fellows when we get back—if we ever do.

New York, May 4.—Cuffs on trousers will remain for the spring 1918 season if the recommendations of the war service committee of the clothing industry to the Commercial Economy Board are adopted. The committee decided that the elimination of the turn-up did not save any cloth, and for this reason its retention will be recommended.

The recommendations made by the designers that the length of sack coats be no more than 30 inches and that all flaps be eliminated from vest pockets were concurred in by the manufacturers. Patched pockets on coats are also to go.

UNTRAINED PUPS AND MEN

Ed Howe says, "If a pup would only stay a pup, we'd buy one." But if Mr. Howe's pup actually stayed a pup, he would soon have a pup for sale. The only way to keep a pup permanently at the "cute" age is to make it of cotton flannel. Arrested development makes a monstrosity out of any living animal, however "cute" its infancy.

A new-born pup is a little squirt of sunshine in a shady world. But he has ninety-nine chances of remaining a pup to one of developing into a wise and useful dog. Most dogs are fit candidates for an institution for feeble-minded animals. This is not the fault, but the fate, of the domesticated dog.

The primitive dog, a self-educated member of the wolf tribe, was one of the wisest quadrupeds on earth. Those of his offspring that lacked wit were snuffed out by hard circumstances and did not propagate their kind. Their parents and their environment taught them all the clever methods of self-defense and self-support.

But if the domestic pup grows to be an educated animal, he must be the exclusive pupil of an educative man. Nor because dogs are well taught, will they continue so from generation to generation. A certain greyhound with a pedigree as long as his own lithe body, was run over by a slow bicycle. The dog did not notice the approaching rider. But this dog's ancestor could spot the wigwag of a jack-rabbit's left ear in the buffalo grass a half mile away. The city can make a fool of any pup.

The education of men, like that of dogs, is a slow and painstaking process. No one college president in a short lifetime ever filled a whole state with scholarly men. No one missionary ever changed a heathen province into a model Christian commonwealth. Dreams of China or of Russia becoming as fine a republic as America overnight are filmy foolishness. And even if these swift and extensive metamorphoses could be brought about, they could not be sustained.

This war will hammer a few rough

world-truths into the thick skulls of dense mortals; but it will not make peasants in our generation into enlightened self-governing citizens, nor keep them thus.
