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## THE GERMANS ACCEPT THE TERMS OF PRES. WILSON

Willing to Evacuate France and Belgium  
 --Government of Austro-Hungary in Accord--The President Asked to Arrange for a Mixed Commission to Plan The Terms of Evacuation.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—The German government in its reply to the recent note sent by President Wilson, accepts the terms laid down by the President in his address of January 8th and subsequent addresses. The text of the German reply was received here tonight and is as follows:

In reply to the questions of the President of the United States of America, the German government hereby declares:

The German government has accepted the terms laid down by President Wilson in his address of January 8th and in his subsequent addresses on the foundation of a permanent peace of justice. Consequently, its object in entering into discussions would be only to agree upon practical details of the application of these terms. The German government believes that the governments of the powers associated with the government of the United States also take the position taken by President Wilson in his address.

The German government, in accordance with the Austro-Hungarian government, for the purpose of bringing about an armistice, declares itself ready to comply with the propositions of the President in regard to evacuation.

The German government suggests that the President may occasion the meeting of a mixed commission for making the necessary arrangements concerning the evacuation. The present German government which has undertaken the responsibility for this step toward peace, has been formed by conferences and in agreement with the great majority of the Reichstag. The Chancellor, supported in all of his actions by the will of this majority, speaks in the name of the German government and of the German people.

### A GERMAN SURRENDER.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—"Germany has extended its hand in surrender not to the foes who hammered her into submission, but to the one enemy whom she has only mildly offended, and whose personal claims for damages will necessarily prove the most moderate. Yet no surrender could be more complete, more sudden, and for these reasons we must hold it in suspicion."

The Times thus summarizes its views on the latest German peace move. Continuing, it adds: "Many rivers of blood have soaked the soil of France and Belgium since President Wilson enunciated his fourteen points. The ravages of Attila and even those of the earlier stages of the German invasion and occupation have been cast into the shade. Yet the fourteen items which Germany now accepts contain no specific provision for any single one of the manifold crimes, nor do they make any reference to the arraignment of the master criminals who inspired the organized atrocities."

"Before President Wilson accepts the role of intermediary now thrust upon him, we trust he will see fit to remind the German Chancellor that each and all of these problems must be faced."

### FRANCE NOT TO BE DECEIVED.

PARIS, Oct. 13.—The reply of the German government to President Wilson's question is considered here to indicate that Germany's diplomatic front is as flexible as her military front. Some of the commentators find the reply so worded as to show the hope of the Germans that it will result in cleavage between the Allies. General Lacroix, in the Temps, says: "Germany's acceptance of President Wilson's terms is an avowal of defeat. Foch is the sole judge from the military point of view and will know how to exact the necessary guarantees from the enemy and what territorial occupations must be imposed." Almost all the newspapers express similar views.

In addition to recalling Bismarck's ruthless method in the 1871 armistice, it is pointed out by some of the papers that when the Germans in 1914 sought to secure France's neutrality, Germany was not willing to accept France's word, but demanded to be permitted to occupy Toul and Verdun as a guarantee.

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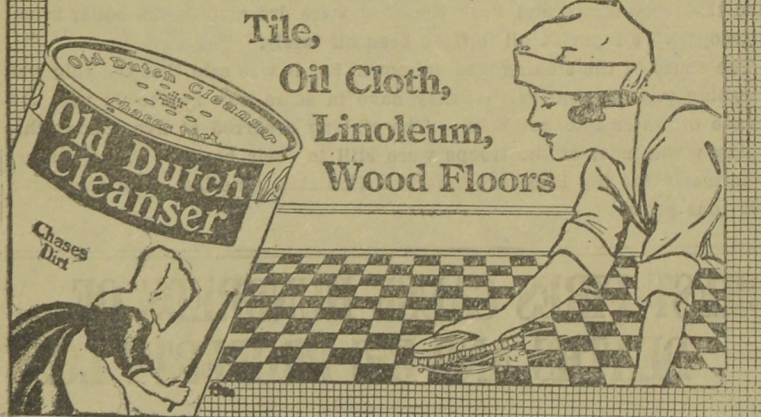
