## STRAIGHT REPLY TO HUNS FROM PRESIDENT WILSON

### Says That Atrocities on Land and Sea Must Cease Before an Armistice Can be Granted---Autocracy Must go---The Allied Governments are of One Accord.

Washington, Oct. 14—President Wilson today informed Germany that the only condition upon which an armistice can be granted is that atrocities on land and sea must cease.

He also gave notice that autocracy must go before final peace can come. When the time to consider an armistice comes, the president said, the military advisors of the United States and the Allies will be consulted and no military advantage of the armies fighting the Central Powers will be lost. The official interpretation of the note as openly expressed was: "Autocracy must go."

#### Full Text of Reply

The text of the president's answer follows:

"Sir: In reply to the communication of the German government dated the 12th instant which you handed to me today, I have the honor to request you to transmit the following answer.

"The unqualified acceptance by the present German government and by a large majority of the Reichstag of the terms laid down by the president of the United States of America in his address to the congress of the United States on the 8th of January 1918, and in his subsequent addresses, justifies the president in making a frank and direct statement of his decision with regard to the communications of the German government of the 8th and 12th of October 1918.

"It must be clearly understood that the process of evacuation and the conditions of an armistice are matters which must be left to the judgment and advice of the military advisors of the government of the United States and the Allied governments and the president feels it is his duty to say that no arrangement can be accepted by the government of the United States which does not provide absolutely satisfactory safeguards and guarantees of the maintenance of the present supremacy of the armies of the United States and the Allies in the field.

"He feels confident that he can safely assume that nothing but this will also be the judgment and decision of the Allied governments.

"The president feels that it is also his duty to add that neither the government of the United States, nor, he is quite sure, the governments with which the government of the United States is associated as a belligerent will consent to consider an armistice so long as the armed forces of Germany continue the illegal and inhuman practices which they still persist in.

#### Recent Outrages Referred to

"At the very time that the German government approaches the government of the United States with proposals of peace its submarines are engaged in sinking passenger ships at sea and not the ships alone but the very boats in which their passengers and crews seek to make their way to safety; and in their present enforced withdrawal from Flanders and France the German armies are pursuing a course of wanton destruction which has always been regarded as indirect violation of the rules and practices of civilized warfare. Cities and villages

if not destroyed are being stripped of all they contain and often of their very inhabitants. The nations associated against Germany cannot be expected to agree to a cessation of arms while acts of inhumanity, spoliation and desolation are being continued which they justly look upon with horror and burning hearts.

"It is necessary, also, in order that there may be no possibility of misunderstanding that the president should very solemnly call the attention of the government of Germany to the language and plain intent of one of the terms of peace which the German government has now accepted. It is contained in the address of the president delivered at Mount Vernon on the fourth of July last.

"It is as follows: 'The destruction of every arbitrary power anywhere that can separately, secretly and of its single choice disturb the peace of the world; or, if it cannot be presently destroyed, at least its reduction to virtual impotency.'

#### Depends Upon Guarantees

"The power which has hitherto controlled the German nation is of the sort here described. It is within the choice of the German nation to alter it. The president's words just quoted naturally constitute a condition precedent to peace, if peace is to come by the action of the German people themselves. The president feels bound to say that the whole process of peace will, in his judgment depend upon the definition and the satisfactory character of the guarantees which can be given in this fundamental matter. It is indispensable that the governments associated against Germany should know beyond a peradventure with whom they are dealing.

"The president will make a separate reply to the Royal and Imperial government of Austria-Hungary.

"Accept sir the renewed assurances of my high consideration.

(Signed) "ROBERT LANSING.

"Mr. Frederick Oederlin, Charge d'Affaires, Ad Interim, in charge of German interests in the United States

President Wilson's reply to the German peace note was vigorously applauded when read to the senate immediately after it had been made public. The senate had remained in session late in order to receive it.

One outstanding point which does not appear in the president's note—a point in which the world has been asking questions—can be answered tonight.

When the president declared that the wrong done to France when Germany took Alsace-Lorraine should be righted, he meant that Alsace-Lorraine should be returned to France.

## BAD FIRE AT WOODSTOCK ON MONDAY

Business Block Wiped Out by Flames—Loss in Vicinity of \$35,000—Small Insurance.

Woodstock, Oct. 14.—A fire that threatened destruction of the whole town occurred this morning, breaking out about 1 o'clock in a wooden block in King street. The fire started in the rear of the store occupied by Jas. McGuire and rapidly spread over the whole block.

It was a most spectacular fire and the roar of the flames was accompanied by the discharge of cartridges in the hardware store of A. E. Jones, keeping up an incessant fire like an artillery barrage.


The Sentinel building proved, as on former occasions, a barrier to the progress of the flames, although it looked serious for this building at one time. It is considerably damaged, but preparations are being made to get out this week's issue of the Sentinel on time.

The following met with total loss: F. E. Jones, barber; Miss McDonough, fancy goods; T. Bradley, fruit and confectionery; A. E. Jones, hardware. Jas. McGuire, groceries; Harold Walhaupfer, meat market; Mrs. Stanley Smith, grocer; Harry Faulkner, stoves and tin ware; Mrs. Brewer, dwelling; Miss Faulkner, dressmaker; Mrs. Sharpe, residence.

Other buildings which were damaged are: The Sentinel, mostly from water; E. W. Mair, photo studio; Dr. Thompson, dentist; Manzer's department store; Bank of Montreal, plate glass front destroyed.

The firemen were considerably handicapped.


