MUSTARD PICKLES.

Don't Pay High Prices for Them—
Make Them Yourself.

Take 1 pint whole small cucumbers, 1 pint sliced cucumbers, 1 pint small whole onions, 1 cup beans, 3 green sweet peppers, three red sweet peppers, 1 pint green fig tomatoes, or 1 pint cauliflower. For dressing use 1 quart vinegar, 4 tablespoons flour, 1 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons powdered mustard, half tablespoon tumeric and 1 tablespoon celery seed.

Cut all vegetables before measuring—tomatoes into halves, cucumbers into slices, string beans into 1½ inch lengths, diagonally or on the bias, and chop peppers. All vegetables should be tender and the whole cucumbers not longer than 2½ inches.

Put all vegetables into a 45 per cent brine (1 cup salt to 1 gallon water) over night, then freshen in clear water for two hours. Let these vegetables stand in liquor of one-half vinegar and one half water for 15 minutes. then scald in same liquor.

To make mustard dressing, rub all the dry ingredients together until smooth, then add the hot vinegar slowly, stirring to make smooth paste. Cook over pan of water, stirring carefully, until the sauce thickens. Then drain the vegetables thoroughly and pour the mustard dressing over them while hot. Mix well and pack in sterilized jars. Boil, or process, ten oz. jars for 20 minutes at 180 deg. Fah.

PUMPKIN PIE.

If the pumpkin is about 16 lbs. in weight, cut from it about five lbs., taking care to pare off all the outside rind, which must be discarded. Then divide the fruit into slices as you would an apple. Have at hand three or four good-sized fruit of the latter character. Dispose of the pumpkins and apples together in a deep dish, adding to the slices one pound and a half of moist sugar, half an ounce of allspice, a sprinkling of cloves, the rind of a fresh lemon, throwing in a cupful of sweet cider. Cover the dish over with a thick, plain paste, and let it bake in a steady oven for one hour; be careful to draw it before it becomes hard.

DAILY FISH BULLETIN.

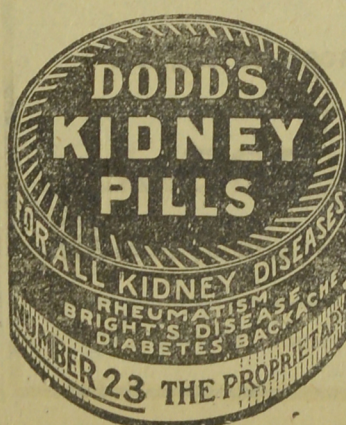
(Issued by the Canada Food

When East Meets West.

Through the efforts of the Canada
Food Board, Pacific fish are now being
sold as far East as Montreal, and At-
lantic fish as far West as Winnipeg.

Recently the first carload of sole and
brill from the Pacific reached Ottawa.
Their coming to the capital was the
nature of an experiment. It was a
successful one, for the 5,000 lbs which
made up the carload found a ready
market. Two pounds for a quarter
was the popular price fixed and they
went like hot cakes.

An enterprising dealer, anticipating
that submarine activities off the Atlan-
tic coast might create a shortage of
fish on the market, had the carload of
Pacific fish brought from Vancouver.
Some time ago two boxes of the same
varieties were received by the Food
Board. Sir Robert and Lady Borden
sampled them and passed very favor-
able judgment upon the fish.
