PEOPLE'S UNION HAS BEEN ORGANIZED AT DOAKTOWN

A public meeting was held in the Doaktown Orange Hall on the 4th instant, for the purpose of organizing the People's Union.

Councillor Arthur O'Donnell was el-Ryan, Boiestown; Henry Swinn, secretary.

Councillor Thomas Parker addressed the meeting, and again explained the objects of the Union and read the report of the Committee. Dr. W. T. Ryan, Boiestown; Henry Swinn, Doaktown; Coun. Arthur O'Donnell, Carroll's Crossing; Alderman H. H. Stuart, Newcastle; Woodrow Gilks, Gilks; Edward Bowes, Moran; and Coun. Parker, Doaktown, appointed at the public meeting at Doaktown, July 3rd last, addressed by Coun. Parker and Ald. Stuart, to draw up a Constitution for a Union of the people of Blissfield and Ludlow parishes.

Coun. Parker reported 130 names of persons signifying their intention of becoming members. Cash receipts \$25 expense \$3; balance on hand \$22.

The following officers were elected: Pres., Otto Hildebrand; Vice-Pres., Arthur O'Donnell; Rec. Sec., Henry Swinn; Fin. Sec.-Treas. and organizer, Coun. Thomas Parker.

Additional members of Executive are Alex. Storey, Walter Ward, Daniel Doak, and Edward Bowes, with five more to be elected from Ludlow at next meeting.

Committee to arrange time and place of next meeting are Arthur O'Donnell, Maurice O'Donnell and Edward Bowes.

The report adopted is as follows:

Preamble

Whereas, it is expedient that those who have common rights to recover or protect and common interests to defend should act together and mutu-

ally strengthen each other to the end that their common and individual rights and interests may be recognized and promoted;

And Whereas, it is due to division or disunion among the masses of the people that their rights are withheld their highest and true interests are frustrated, and their best and noblest efforts for the public welfare defeated;

And Whereas, it must be obvious to every reflecting mind that a united purpose and a thorough knowledge of each other's rights and interests is essential to the private welfare of every citizen as well as in the interest of the body politic;

Therefore the time has come that there should be formed in this County of Northumberland a PEOPLE'S UNION with a branch thereof for each Parish, such People's Union to consist of all citizens of the age of twenty-one years and over, who are desirous of supporting to the utmost of their ability the principle of equal rights to all and special privileges to none, which principle demands.

The amendment of the Workman's Compensation Act so as to provide that all who work in the Lumber woods cutting, hauling or driving logs or otherwise helping in the Lumber industry, and all other classes of useful workers, shall be as fully protected and guaranteed against loss as are those of the industries now included in said Act;

Greater interest on the part of Government in the Farming industry.

A just and reasonable administration of the law governing settlement on the Crown Lands of the Province.

Greater attention to and better facilities for the education of the children of the land; and generally,

The counteracting of the influence of combines and monopolies, which are extremely prejudicial to the interests of the people as a whole.

FOURTEEN PEACE CONDITIONS LAID DOWN BY PRES. WILSON

(From address to Congress Jan. 8, 1918.)

1. Open covenants of peace without private international understandings.
2. Absolute freedom of the seas in peace or war, except as they may be closed by international action.
3. Removal of all economic barriers and establishment of equality of trade conditions among nations consenting to peace and associating themselves for its maintenance.
4. Guarantees for the reduction of national armaments to the lowest point consistent with domestic safety.
5. Impartial adjustment of all colonial claims based upon the principle that the peoples concerned have equal weight with the interest of the government.
6. Evacuation of all Russian territories and opportunity for Russia's political development.
7. Evacuation of Belgium without any attempt to limit her sovereignty.
8. All French territory to be freed and restored, and reparation for the taking of Alsace-Lorraine.
9. Readjustment of Italy's frontiers along clearly recognizable lines of nationality.
10. Freest opportunity for autonomous development of the peoples of Austria-Hungary.
11. Evacuation of Roumania, Serbia and Montenegro, with access to the sea for Serbia, and international guarantees of economic and political independence and territorial integrity of the Balkan States.
12. Secure sovereignty for Turkey's portion of the Ottoman Empire, but with nationalities under Turkish rule assured security of life and opportunity for autonomous development, with the Dardanelles permanently opened to all nations.
13. Establishment of an independent Polish state, including territories inhabited by indisputably Polish population, with free access to the sea and political integrity guaranteed by international covenant.
14. General association of nations under specific covenants for mutual guarantees of political independence and territorial integrity to large and small states alike.

SAVE NEEDLES, FOR NONE ARE BEING MADE

Chicago, Oct. 8.—Squeeze the old pin-cushion and clean the carpet sweeper for needles are getting scarcer every hour. No one knows where the next supply is to come from.

The needle famine felt in May of this year, has become a grave reality. At present darning needles are practically off the market, and sewing needles, especially in the smaller sizes will be obtainable for a limited time only. After that, according to wholesale buyers and sellers of needles, relatively no supply is forthcoming.

The needle shortage is a war condition. English needles, the best made,

are not to be had, because the steel is being put to war uses, and the cheaper grade German needles are no longer on the American market. The American output will not meet even a small part of the demand.

Conservation workers regard the needle famine as a serious setback in the saving of wool and other cloth stuffs, where mending plays an important part. Others expressed regret that stockings may be thrown away undarned for want of needles, despite the fact the yarn shortage is so acute.

In Chicago the large department stores are limiting their customers to a single package, sold for ten cents, as against the former price of 5 cents. In small district stores, where shortage is felt sooner, ordinary sewing needles cost a cent each.
