

## QUARANTINE FOR RETURNED DETACHMENT

**THE CENTRAL ONTARIO  
TROOPS HAVE ARRIVED**

**Train Got in at 8 o'clock This  
Morning--Measles Caused  
the Return of the De-  
tachment.**

The reinforcing detachment of the Central Ontario Regiment which was quartered in the Exhibition Buildings here for several days pending its transfer elsewhere and which left early Sunday morning via the C.G.R., returned here early this morning, detaching at eight o'clock. The return is on account of an outbreak of measles among the soldiers since their departure from Fredericton. The detachment will go into quarantine here for several days.

**I.O.D.E. Prepared.**  
The hour of the arrival of the soldiers here was indefinite and they were expected last night but failed to arrive. To prepare for the soldiers the ladies of Governor Carleton Chapter, I.O.D.E., went to the Exhibition Buildings yesterday and prepared supper. Sergt. Ray Brewer of this city, and Sergt. Fowkes of Gagetown, were left in charge when the hour grew late. The soldiers, however, had been well looked after by the military authorities and were served with breakfast on the train this morning from a commissariat car.

**Much Inconvenience.**  
This detachment has had its troubles. It was four days coming here from Toronto and on leaving Fredericton suffered from cold through the delay in the departure of the train.

**Assistant Assessors.**  
Messrs. Harry Mackey and Peter Farrell were reappointed assistant assessors by the City Council last night.

**Can Solemnize Marriages.**  
Rev. H. R. Bell of the Baptist Church, Disciples, Lord's Cove, Charlotte County, has been licensed under provincial statute to solemnize marriages.

**Refreshments for Firemen.**  
The members of the fire department while working at the fire early this morning were served with hot coffee at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. McLellan.

**Chimney Fire Last Night**  
A chimney fire at the residence of Mrs. Thomas Morris, Charlotte Street gave the firemen a run shortly after midnight. The house was not damaged but the chimney was in a dangerous state.

**Porter-McKinnon.**  
Paul E. Porter of Mont Joli, Que., formerly of Andover, and Miss Helen McKinnon of this city, were married at Montreal on Friday last. The groom is a graduate of U.N.B. With his bride he is now in Fredericton, but will shortly return to Mont Joli.

**Offers to Sell City Coal**  
Capt. Russell Bellamy who has been a resident of Fredericton for some time has made an offer to the city to sell 1,600 tons of coal from the mine which he recently opened in Queen's County. He has not quoted any price, however, not yet being in a position to do so.

**For Protection at Crossings**  
In accordance with the request of the Board of Trade the city council last night instructed the city clerk to write the Department of Railways in regard to the necessity for gates and automatic signals at the George and Charlotte Streets crossings of the C. G. R. in this city.

**Want Flying Machine**  
The Canadian Aviation Fund has written the City Clerk suggesting that Fredericton follow the example of various English and Canadian cities and furnish a machine for the Aviation Service in Canada. On account of the cost of a machine it is not likely that the city will act in the matter.

**Eighteen Below Zero.**  
Eighteen below zero was the unofficial temperature here last night and the high wind made it seem much colder. Today the weather moderated considerably and for a time there was a slight flurry of snow. The train service on the C.P.R. which was badly demoralized last night and yesterday, is improved today.

**Have Signed Memorial.**  
A memorial of the Union of Canadian Municipalities praying that the Dominion Government take steps to bring about closer co-operation between the government and the municipalities of Canada has been received by the city of Fredericton. The mayor and city clerk have signed it and it has been returned to the Union.

**Thermometers Vary Greatly**  
Many of the extremely low temperatures reported this winter are due to inaccurate thermometers. At six o'clock last evening three thermometers in Queen Street between Regent Street and Barker House Alley showed a variation of nine degrees. One was six degrees below, another nine degrees below, and the third fifteen degrees below.

**Protests Against Woodpile.**  
The Local Improvement Association has protested against the piling of wood by the city on the city common along Waterloo Row. Ald. Burnett, chairman of the Wood Committee of the City Council, has ordered the piling of wood there discontinued. It was piled there for the purpose of supplying possible customers in the eastern end of the city. If not sold before the end of the winter it will be removed while the snow lasts.

## CONTROLLER OF FUEL SEEKS INFORMATION

**INCREASED PRODUCTION  
OF FUEL IS DESIRED**

**G. H. Prince Securing Informa-  
tion Concerning the Condi-  
tions in Central New  
Brunswick.**

The Department of the Fuel Controller already has taken steps to ascertain the outlook for wood for fuel in central New Brunswick. Mr. Clyde Leavitt of the Forestry Branch, Conservation Commission, is in charge of that portion of the Fuel Controller's Department which deals with wood fuel and on his instructions Mr. G. H. Prince of this city, head of the Forestry Survey of the Provincial Department of Lands and Mines, is obtaining information concerning conditions in this section. This week he interviewed a large number of prominent fuel dealers and secured information. It is evidently the wish of the Fuel Controller's Department that the supply of wood fuel cut in this section of New Brunswick be doubled.

**Coal Will Be Scarce.**  
There is every prospect that coal will be a scarce commodity next winter. The fuel situation in the United States will directly affect the anthracite situation. Canada will be placed on coal rations as far as American hard coal is concerned. This will make an increased demand for bituminous coal and wood.

**Minto Coal in Demand.**  
The entire situation will make a heavy demand for Minto coal as the Nova Scotia mines will probably send less of their output to this section and the amount of coal mined there is likely to show no increase. In past years Grand Lake coal has not had a good reputation in this section on account of poor methods of mining but improved methods have changed the class of the output and there is an increasing demand. Already prices for Minto coal has advanced on account of the general fuel situation. It is quite likely that by next winter people of Fredericton will be glad to get Minto coal and will be grateful that they are within a few miles of the mines.
