

## DR. FRADSHAM DIED TUESDAY IN CHICAGO

NATIVE OF DEVON AND  
A GRADUATE OF U. N.B.

Masonic Funeral Will Take  
Place on Sunday—Son of  
Mrs. Horatio Fradsham  
of Devon.

Mrs. H. Fradsham of Devon yesterday received a telegram from Chicago informing her of the death of her son Dr. William Fradsham in that city after a lengthy illness. The deceased was aged thirty seven years and was a graduate of the University of New Brunswick in civil engineering of the class of 1902. He practised his profession for some years at Pittsburgh, Pa., and other places in the United States, and later studied osteopathy and medicine and in recent years practised them in Chicago, where he had been located for some eight years.

### Surviving Relatives

The deceased is survived by a widow, also his mother Mrs. Horatio Fradsham of Devon, one brother Mr. Harry Fradsham with the C. G. R. at Devon, also two sisters Mrs. Fred C. Barker of Sheffield and Miss Louisa F. Fradsham at home. Miss Fradsham left for Chicago on Monday but reached there after her brother's death which occurred on the 28th. The body will arrive here tomorrow at noon. The funeral which will take place Sunday afternoon at 2.30 will be under Masonic auspices.

Curtailing Operations

They are now setting out their cabbage plants but tomatoes and cucumbers will not be set out until about the 10th of June. Tomato and cucumber plants are very delicate and can be killed by one degree of frost. This is why the market gardeners of Maugeville delay setting them out until the second week in June.

## RETURN OF FLOUR GOING ON STEADILY

FARMERS ARE TAKING  
ADVANTAGE ALLOWED

Dealers View the Matter from  
Different Point—Business  
Men's Committee Doing  
Valuable Service.

The return of flour to the dealers and in some cases to the millers under the regulations of the Canada Food Board is going on steadily in this province as far as is known. Farmers who singly or in groups have purchased flour together with feed have the privilege of returning the flour by the simple process of taking it to the nearest railway station and consigning it to the firm from which it was purchased. A fair price must be paid for it. It is this custom on the part of the millers to consign flour with every lot of feed sold by them which has done much to cause excess purchase of flour throughout Canada, although a fear that the standard war flour would prove inferior also had a similar effect. The situation is reported to be gradually clearing.

### The Dealer's Position

The dealer in feed and flour who in the past had the privilege of buying feed and flour in carload lots regards the farmer rather as an interloper as far as the buying of feed without flour is concerned. He claims further that a trade connection which had been built up during a long period of years in many cases is going to be seriously injured by the regulation.

A new feature of the situation has developed recently as the farmers now are in a position to compel the millers to sell them feed and as the price fixed by the Food Board is low there has been a marked demand for feed. The demand of the Western Provinces in which the most of the wheat is raised that they should have the first call on the feed which is the by-product of the milling has tended to further complicate the situation. A shortage in feeds has resulted.

### Business Men's Committees

Dr. W. C. Keirstead, provincial representative of the Food Board has organized Business Men's Committees in St. John, Sussex and Moncton and will organize one in Fredericton. All trades licensed by the Food Board are represented on these boards and they are doing much good.

### Late Charles McConnell

The funeral of the late Charles McConnell took place this afternoon from his late residence in Doak Settlement. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Lewis, and interment was made at Forest Hill Cemetery.

In the absence from the province of Dr. G. C. VanWart, the chair at the meeting of the School Board yesterday was occupied by Mr. J. J. Weddall. The other members in attendance included Mrs. W. G. Clark, Mrs. P. Cox, Mr. J. W. Spurdin, Dr. W. C. Crockett, M. P. P., Mr. J. M. Lemont, Mr. P. J. Hughes, and Mr. A. A. Shute.

According to the Secretary's report several of the teachers were off duty for short periods during the month. With the expenses of the Board being nearly doubled in some respects the demand for increase of salary still continues, three or four applications of this character being received yesterday.

A letter was read from the Chief Superintendent of Education stating that the Board of Education gave its approval to the request of the Fredericton Food Conservation Committee to address the schools and circulate Junior Pledge Cards,—this in all cases to be subject to the sanction of the School Board.

An application for a position on the High School staff was read from a former graduate who has been teaching in another section of the province. The name was entered on the applicants' book.

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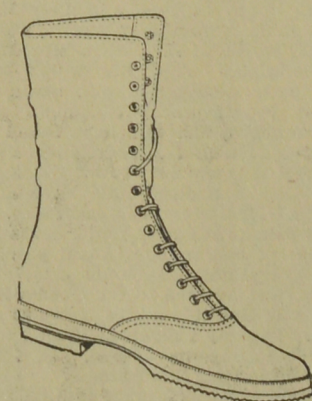
