### HOW IT FEELS TO FALL A MILE UPSIDE DOWN

Lieut. Ely, of Lafayette Esca-  
drille, in Posthumous Let-  
ter, Describes Escape in  
Long Plunge.

(New York Sun.)

Hurling earthward in an aeroplane  
upside down from a height of 5,000  
feet is an experience few aviators  
survive to describe. Just what a fly-  
er's sensations are throughout such  
a desperate fight for control were  
vividly pictured in a letter written to  
a classmate by Lieut. Dinsmore Ely  
of the Lafayette Escadrille, who died  
a few days ago in France from in-  
juries suffered in a subsequent air-  
plane accident.

Lieut. Ely's story of his fall is told  
in a letter from France, as follows:

"My worst experience in the air was  
awaiting me. We flew in the after-  
noon. I took a machine and a para-  
chute and climbed to 1,800 metres.  
We were only supposed to climb to  
1,400, but I disobeyed and it probably  
saved my life. I threw out the para-  
chute and took a couple of turns at  
it. After diving at the thing and  
mounting again, I started into a  
roundersment with my eyes on the  
parachute.

Lost Control of the Plane.

"Unconsciously, I went into a loop  
and stopped in the upside down posi-  
tion, where I hung by my belt. I took  
the motor and grabbed a strut to hold  
myself in my seat. The machine fell  
in its upside down position till it gained  
terrible speed; then it slowly turned  
over into a nose dive, and I came  
out in a tight spiral, which slowly  
widened into a circle at ligne de vol,  
but the controls were almost useless.

agine what loss of control in an auto-  
mobile going at high speed would be,  
but you cannot imagine what loss of  
control of an airplane speed would be  
any more than a lumberjack can im-  
agine a million dollars.

Brain was Working Clearly.

"I did not regain control of any sort  
till I was 400 metres from the earth,  
and then I could do nothing but spiral  
to the left.

"From 400 metres I spiraled down  
with barely enough motor to keep me  
from falling, in order that the strain  
on the controls would be minimum.  
The old brain was working clearly,  
and I made a fine adjustment of the  
throttle and gasoline—just enough to  
counteract the resistance of controls,  
crossed in order to counteract the  
bent wings and just let the plane sink  
fast enough so that it would hit the  
ground against the wind. I managed  
to control the spiral just enough to  
land on the only available landing  
ground in the vicinity. The landing  
was perfect, but the machine rolled in  
a ditch and tipped up on its nose.

### RETALIATION ADVISED BY LORD NEWTON

London, May 5. — In the course of  
an address delivered at Newton, Lan-  
cashire, Lord Newton, assistant sec-  
retary of foreign affairs, after referring  
to those who are dissatisfied because  
German prisoners of war in England  
are not employed under the same  
working conditions as British and other  
prisoners are in Germany, said his  
experience was that the best policy  
was to treat the prisoners well.

"It would hover," he said, "be idio-  
tic not to retaliate when necessary  
and during the last few days retali-  
ation has been put into operation at a  
certain German officers' camp in  
Great Britain because a corps com-  
mander of the tenth German army per-  
sistently refused to remove grievances  
complained of by our men.

"If the question were left to me,"  
he added, "in view of recent captures  
and knowing what our men will have  
to undergo I would be prepared to go  
further than we have done."
