

WOOL AT LOCAL WAREHOUSE WILL GRADE HIGH

An Expert From the Live Stock Branch of the Federal Department of Agriculture in the City --- Vigorous Campaign Has Been Carried on in the Interest of Wool Growers of the Province

J. D. Thompson, expert wool grader from the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, has arrived at Fredericton to grade the wool at the Fredericton warehouse. Next week he proceeds to Moncton to grade the wool at the Moncton warehouse. These wool warehouses are operated in connection with the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, Ltd. an Association organized to promote the sheep interests of Canada.

The Provincial Department of Agriculture has carried on a vigorous campaign in co-operation with the Live Stock Branch and the Association to further interest the wool growers in

this method of marketing whereby the middlemen and local buyers are eliminated. The wool passing direct from the grower to the purchaser.

By marketing through the Association farmers can confidently expect to get the highest possible price obtainable. Speaking of prices Mr. Thompson states that he has recently visited the Boston market and was given to understand that prices would range even higher than he had expected. Furthermore Mr. Thompson reports that the wool at the Fredericton warehouse will grade very high and that it is in the best condition of any wool

GERMAN YOUTHS NO LONGER RUSH TO THE COLORS

Washington, June 9.—German youth no longer rushes to the colors with the enthusiasm that marked the mobilization of 1914, according to an article in the Berlin Vossische Zeitung, telling of the war time impairment of the German educational system.

"The spirit of voluntary service, which at the beginning of the war revealed itself in its fairest aspect, has now disappeared," says the article. "Everywhere we hear lamentations over the increasing distaste shown for military service."

Scholastic standards in the public school have fallen so low, it is said, that "promotions no longer represent any definite standard of accomplishment." Scholastic efficiency has suffered considerably because pupils subsisting on war diets for long periods are found to be generally undernourished.

Juvenile delinquency has spread to an alarming extent, and it is announced that "already the number of violent crimes committed by youths in the city of Berlin is more than three times the number reported in 1914."

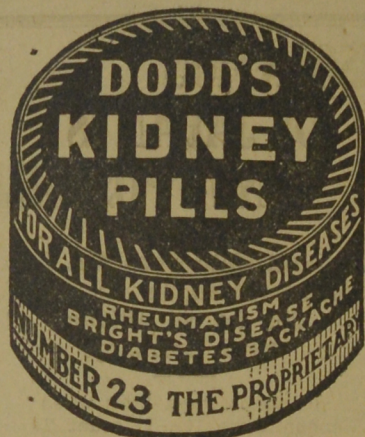

The main idea to keep in mind in marketing wool co-operatively is that the Association forces local buyers to pay somewhere near what the wool is worth and farmers should keep this in mind. Again the Association wool is graded and properly prepared. The Association caters to the Woolen Mills and gives them exactly what they want. They get a guaranteed product and consequently are willing to pay the highest market value.

The warehouses at Fredericton and Moncton will continue to take in wool during the entire month of June. Those farmers that have not any standard sacks or twine can ship in clean bran sacks and in lieu of paper twine can use the neck band to tie each fleece with separately.

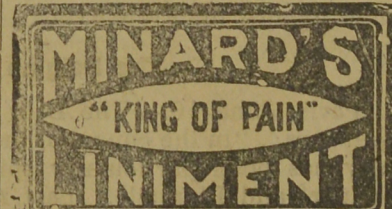
