GERMANS MAKE ANOTHER THRUST ON WESTERN FRONT

Gain Some Ground Between Montdidier and Noyon on a Twenty Mile Front-- French Troops Made a Powerful Resistance --- Only Advanced Positions Penetrated by Enemy --- Attack Commenced At 4.30 O'clock on Sunday Morning

Paris June 9—In a new thrust directed at the sector between Mont Didier and Noyon the Germans have succeeded in gaining ground along about a twenty mile front to a depth of about two and a half miles at certain points, according to the war office announcement tonight. The fighting was very heavy and the French offered a powerful resistance to the multiplied efforts of the enemy and finally succeeded in checking the advance particularly on the two wings.

The text of the statement reads: "A new offensive begun this morning by the German army developed with sustained violence on a front of thirty-five kilometres (approximately 21.8 miles) between Mont Didier and the Oise. The enemy, in great force, multiplied his efforts to drive through our lines but our troops everywhere sustained the shock along the entire battle line. Stubborn engagements stopped or seriously retarded the enemy thrust.

"To the left the Germans did not succeed in crossing our covering zone and were strongly held by our troops on the line of Rubescourt, LeFrettoy and Mortemer, which they had reached.

"On the centre the progress of the enemy was more appreciable. After successful attacks, which were murderous to their troops, the Germans succeeded in taking foot in the villages of Ressons-Sur-Matz and Mar-euil, where our units of the first lines continued to offer defense foot by foot.

"On the right the enemy met with resistance not less energetic, and despite his repeated efforts, we held him on the front comprising Belvad, Canectancourt and Ville."

Blow Falls at 4.30 a. m.

Paris, June 9—The Germans began an attack in force at 4.30 o'clock this morning to the west of the front of the recent battle, striking along the sector between Mont Didier and Noyon. The official report says the French are resisting valiantly and that the battle is still raging.

On the front between the Oise and the Aisne and also south of the Ourcq the French made gains last night.

The official announcement follows: "The Germans began at midnight a violent preparatory artillery fire from

the region north of Mont Didier as far as to the east of the Oise, the French batteries immediately intensifying their fire in counter-preparation.

"At 4.30 o'clock the German infantry made an attack on the French positions between Mont Didier and Noyon. Our troops are resisting with magnificent valor in the protracted zone. The battle is continuing.

"Between the Oise and the Aisne the French this morning carried out a local operation east of Hautebraye and gained ground, taking sixty prisoners. South of the Ourcq the French improved their positions east of Chezy. The Germans who succeeded at 10 o'clock last night in penetrating the French lines near Vafly were thrown out completely by a French counter-attack. At the same time the French captured Eloup Wood and this morning the wood directly south of Bussieres. In these operations we took two hundred prisoners, including five officers.

"West of Rheims, after a spirited bombardment the Germans attacked in the region of Virgny. They suffered serious losses without obtaining any results. On the remainder of the front there is nothing to report."

London, June 9—"Up to about mid-morning," says the Reuter correspondent at French headquarters, "the enemy advance on the Montdidier-Noyon line was confined to our advanced zone. Our principal line of resistance was not touched."

Seeking Road to Paris
French Army Headquarters, June 9—(Afternoon, via Reuter's Ottawa Agency) The German offensive which opened this morning on a twenty-five mile front was preceded by a heavy gas shell bombardment. The enemy gains have as yet been confined to our advanced zone, which was within the range of a destructive fire from his minenwerfers.

Our principal line of resistance is untouched, according to the latest reports. The enemy probably intends to turn to the right between Matz and the Oise by an advance between Matz and Noyon, with the object of obtaining a clear way towards Paris with the Oise protecting his right in conjunction with a later move from the Soissons-Chateau Thierry line.

SIR ROBERT HAS ARRIVED IN LONDON

Canadian Premier and Party All Well—Speaks in Praise of French-Canadian Soldiers.

London, June 10.—Sir Robert Borden arrived in London on Saturday afternoon accompanied by three Canadian ministers, Messrs. Meighen, Calder and Rowell. There were also in the party the Premiers of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and the Australian and New Zealand representatives to the conference.

An uneventful, but protracted voyage ended late on Friday night, every member of the party being well. Sir Edward Kemp and Sir George Perley greeted the arrivals in London and Admiralty and Colonial Office representatives were also present. Premier Borden said: "I am happy to know the work of the Imperial Cabinet and conference begins early next week. There are matters of importance in Canada awaiting our return and we are anxious to accomplish the mission with the least possible delay.

The spirit of the Canadian people is still resolute and indomitable and will continue so. Certain disturbances in Quebec were greatly exaggerated by the press. The people of that province have become more thoroughly awakened to the gravity of the situation and thousands of men in Quebec are coming forward.

"The splendid valor of Canadians of French origin has been proved under the severest tests during the present war. No braver or truer men are to be found in the Allied armies than those who flock to the colors from Quebec."
