#### CANADA'S GOOD WORK FOR RETURNED MEN

The work that Canada has done and is doing for her wounded soldiers in the way of hospital treatment and re-education is fully set forth in "Canada's Work for Wounded Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment, and shortly to be exhibited in theatres throughout Canada.

It is little realised by the Canadian public that Canada leads the world in this work, her system having been copied by Australia, and more recently by the United States.

The film shows every phase of the work, from the deck of a hospital ship in a Canadian port to the shop, office, or farm where the returned soldier is working, after having been educated at government expense. Any man whose war wounds prevent him from resuming his pre-war occupation is entitled to such education, and is trained in a suitable trade or profession.

Some of the most interesting scenes in the film are those illustrating occupational therapy, where men are encouraged to the use of injured muscles or members by being given some simple and useful work such as carpentry and woodcarving, not only to the general public, but to medical men are the scenes showing the use of the apparatus at Hart House, Toronto, and other places, for restoring flexibility and power to arms, legs and fingers made impotent by war wounds.

The film took eight months to complete, and the camera man travelled from coast to coast to photograph it.

## YANKEES AT CANTIGNY USED EVERY KNOWN DEVICE

Pigeons Carried News of the Progress of the Battle Back and Forth—Were Often Tardy in Arriving, and Investigation Revealed the Cause—Mating Birds were Used—Male Birds Always Had a Date to Keep.

"Romance played its part in the battle of Cantigny and played the very devil with the communications," says Stars and Stripes, the daily newspaper published by the American Expeditionary Forces in France. "In that battle Americans used every known device of modern warfare, and what Yankee troops in that particular sector did not happen to have they borrowed from the French.

"Tidings as to how the battle was progressing were brought back by birds when the distance was too great for signals and the fire too heavy for wires, and when the emergency was too urgent for runners.

"Pigeons often speed overhead with messages, a satisfactory means of communication when others break down. So it was at Cantigny, when the portentous message of victory entrusted to the birds arrived at divisional headquarters 23 hours and 40 minutes late.

#### Investigate Tardy Pigeon

"Pigeons seldom loiter, so there was an immediate investigation. It was learned that the man in charge of the basket had placed mating pigeons together. When the male bird was taken out and the message fastened to his leg, his mind was on something of far more consequence to him than the battle. His mind was on the bird of his heart, and around her basket he hovered and circled."

That's the romance the Stars and Stripes discovered in the Cantigny fight.

The trench newspaper tells of the care with which these birds are handled.

"The home of these birds is never far behind the lines, always ten or twelve kilometers behind the first line. They live in coops that look like high set, portable corn cribs. The carrier pigeon problem in wartime is that of accustoming a homing bird to a migratory coop.

"The war pigeons are all fed and sheltered in the same coop, and the coop is never left more than a few months in one place. It is constantly shifted lest the birds become too much at home in one place.

#### Birds Well Cared For

"Care to feed the birds on the high shelf of the coop is always taken and never by any chance is a stray morsel of food allowed to fall upon the ground. Once a bird forms the habit of looking on the ground for food

there is a chance of its flight being retarded.

"As a diet to take the place of little rough pebbles a bird will eat in order to crush its food, the fanciers break up a piece of brick for the army pigeons.

"Birds are protected from gas fumes by a large covering that looks like a tea cosy which is placed over the basket whenever necessary.

"Of the veteran birds used the first months after the inauguration of the carrier service by the French few are now at the front. They are now being used for breeding.

"Birds are classified as to age, station, catalogue number and army affiliation. Some of this data is stamped in blue ink on the bird's wing. The French caretakers are known as colombophiles, which, literally translated, means lovers of pigeons."

## PEOPLE IN SPOKANE BREW THEIR OWN BEER

Drug Stores Sell a Formula and Hardware Dealers Furnish Bottles and Caps—Strong Stuff.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 21.—Half a dozen large breweries in Spokane were closed January 1, 1916, according to law, but in their places hundreds of small individual breweries have started operations.

Today practically every drug store in Spokane is prepared to furnish patrons with a printed formula for making home-made beer and the hardware stores of the city are reaping a small fortune from the sale of bottling equipment.

On the formulas furnished by the drug stores is printed the name of a dealer and grower of hops, and patrons are solicited to send for that portion of the composition with which to make the "home-made brew" which incidentally may contain more "kick" than the beer turned out by the large breweries.

## ITALIAN SHIP ESCAPED FROM SUBMARINE

An Atlantic Port, Aug. 21.—An Italian steamer arrived here today and reported having had a running fight with a German submarine off the New England coast last Tuesday. Five of the steamers crew were injured and the ship has a six foot hole stove in her amidships by a shell from the U-boat. The battle lasted three hours and according to the master of the Italian vessel, more than two hundred shots were fired. The submarine, he said, opened fire without warning.

The injured men suffered from flying splinters and fragments of shells. One of the steamers guns was put out of commission.

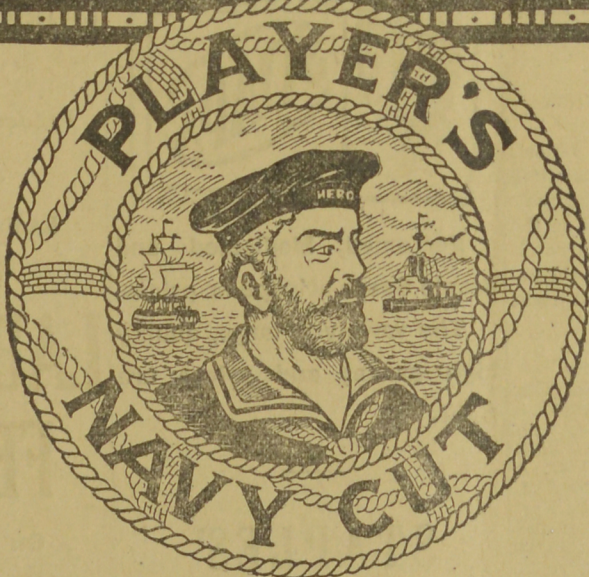

The machine to put the caps on the bottles is sold for \$5, though a different style, which is used with an ordinary hammer, but which is "not nearly as fast as the \$5 machine," is also displayed. Customers are warned not to make the beer too "hrad" as it is liable to blow up the bottle and injure the maker as it ferments rapidly.

To date the police have taken no steps in the matter of this "home made beer," though the law is plain that beer containing more than one per cent alcohol cannot legally be kept in the state.
