"Senior Lieut. Grener" Writes Account of Bombing Expedition to London, "the City of His Dreams"—Unusual Bit of Publicity.

London, May 9.—The veil of mystery that has shrouded the enemy air policy has lifted slightly. An article describing the experience of a German airman participating in an air raid on London appeared recently in the Berliner Illustrirte Zeitung.

The strange medley of fact and fiction therein contained bears the signature of "Watch Officer Senior Lt. of the Naval Reserve Grener."

However, as officers on active service are prohibited from contributing to the press, the signature is very probably fictitious. More than likely the source can be traced to the offices of the journal concerned.

Where the average Englishman awaits the arrival of the sky raiders with an expressive "damn," makes certain of the safety of his women folk, then calmly resumes his business, the German, hovering thousands of feet above his head, indulges in effusion of the worst kind. car craft and envelop us. Suddenly it gleams bright as day.

"Now shrapnel is bursting fiercely all around us. Shells are tearing at us like birds of prey with flaming eyes. Fore and aft, below us, above us, everywhere, they scream and roar. It is hellish, yet beautiful. And loud above the crash of the thundering shells we hear the deep bass of our faithful bombs—bom—bom—bom—and always the orchestral accompaniment to the concert supplied by our whirling propellers.

"But we are doing things in London, too. There on our starboard is a mighty cavern, and there to port another. In their proximity, where a fourth bomb has dropped, there is a whole series of explosions. Heavens! but we're letting them have it this time! There is Comrade von L— at work. He has peppered London before. Only tonight he is less excited."

Below, had the senior Lieutenant but known, the din and fury was less aggravated. Beyond the deafening and incessant thunder of the guns and the tense anxiety of the waiting there was little to fear for those under cover. Now and then a hasty whisper would fly around the gatherings in the cellars and the tubes as an unusually loud explosion took place—"a bomb." But further than that they listened carefully to the guns. Suddenly there would come a lapse in the firing; but only for a little while. Then they would be at it again. Until, with what seemed to be a last, concerted fury, they began to die away faintly toward the east; then an unnerving quietude!

"But things are getting too hot for us. Away from this inhospitable neighborhood. A caressing west wind is at our back, and amid protecting clouds we start on our return journey to the coast. Here another, still heavier but equally futile, bombardment awaits us. We've been so busy that nobody has had time to remember that our visit to England tonight has been in freezing cold. Our artificial breathing apparatus is almost glued to our lips by the Arctic frost. But it's warmer now. Gradually our nerves and lungs resume their normal functions. Home coats beckon to us, and before we know it we're safe again and landing on friendly soil."

NOTICE

NOTICE is hereby given to all residents, non-residents and corporations, whether within or without the Province, in compliance with "An Act respecting the taxation of Wild Lands" passed 11th April, 1918, to file with the Minister of Lands and Mines at the Crown Land Office in Fredericton, on or before the first of July, 1918, a statement of the number of acres subject to the tax as provided by the Act; parishes where the land is situated; what fractional part of the interest in said lands is held by resident and by non-resident owners, or if owned by a corporation, what fractional part of the stock is held by resident and by non-resident stockholders and the name and address of the manager, managing owner or managing director of said land.

Upon failure to comply with this demand an additional tax of one cent per acre may be imposed, not exceeding in the whole the sum of \$30 in addition to the tax as prescribed by the Act.

Taxes are payable at the Crown Land Office in Fredericton on or before the first of September, 1918, and remittances can be forwarded in the name of T. G. Loggie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines.
