

KINGSCLEAR MAN FACES SEVERAL CHARGES

A. GOODINE VIOLATED GAME AND FISHERY LAWS

Also Charged with Assaulting Fisheries Warden Last Fall —Concerned in Shooting of Horse.

Alfred Goodine of Kingsclear, was arrested yesterday on the charge of violation of the New Brunswick Game Act by hunting deer out of season. The prosecution is the result of the shooting of a horse belonging to Frank Cassidy of Kingsclear some days ago while the animal was being used in hauling pulpwood on the road, the shot being fired by some person in the woods. Later it was learned that Goodine and another man were hunting deer at the time.

Other Charges.
Goodine faces other charges as Dominion Fisheries Inspector H. E. Harrison has laid a charge of violation of the Fisheries Regulations against him and he also is charged with an assault on the Fisheries Regulations against him, these offenses having been committed last autumn. Since that time Goodine has been in hiding or has been difficult to locate. The assault was made while the warden was discharging his duty.

Judgment for Plaintiff.
Judgment for the plaintiff with costs was entered here Tuesday in the York county court in the action of A. Edgar Hanson vs. Edmund Violette. The suit was for work performed as a surveyor in Victoria county. It was undefended.

Died of Typhoid at Halifax.
Sergeant Arthur B. Caldwell of Havelock, died recently at Halifax from typhoid. The deceased at the time of enlisting in the 9th Siege Battery was an undergraduate at the University of New Brunswick. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. R. H. Caldwell of Havelock, one sister, Mrs. Stanley Young of Intervale Station and two brothers, Thomas at home, and Robert, a telegraph operator with the C. P. R., who formerly was an operator with the Western Union in this city.

Clock to be Sold
The grandfather's clock won on a lottery by Mrs. R. F. Randolph and donated by her for patriotic purposes, will be offered for sale at auction in the assembly chamber at 4.30 p. m. tomorrow (Thursday). Mr. Frank L. Potts, M. P. P., the most expert auctioneer in the province, has consented to officiate. Business in the House will be suspended for the occasion and the auction proceedings promise to be highly interesting. There is much interest in the sale and a large attendance is expected.

Former Resident Dead.
Word has been received here of the death at Dorchester, Mass., on Tuesday morning of John Damery, a former resident of this city and Marysville. He was a carriage blacksmith by trade and was well known in this city. For some years he was manager of the Barker House stable. He is survived by a widow, one daughter, Maggie, at Lowell, two sons, John, at home, and Charles, who is overseas with the 236th Battalion. Charles Damery, who was once proprietor of the Park Hotel at St. John, is a brother.

Had Relatives Here.
The Hopewell Hill correspondent of the Telegraph writes: "Samuel S. Calhoun, an old and well known resident of Lower Cape, died at his home there yesterday. Although in failing health for the last two or three years, he was about as usual during the day, when he suddenly took an attack and passed away in a short time. Mr. Calhoun was a member of the well known Calhoun family, who were long prominent in Hopewell activities, but of whom few remain." Mrs. E. W. Shiels, of this city, is a daughter of the deceased.

Teachers' Convention.
A meeting of the program committee of the Maritime Teachers' Convention to be held in Moncton on August 27th, 28th and 29th will be held in Moncton on Friday morning next. The members on the committee are Dr. A. H. MacKay, Superintendent of Education and Dr. D. Solomon, principal of the Provincial Normal School, of Nova Scotia; Mr. H. H. Shaw, acting Superintendent of Education, and Dr. Robertson, principal of the Prince of Wales College, from Prince Edward Island, and Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, and Dr. H. S. Bridges, superintendent of St. John schools, for New Brunswick.

Recruiting for Engineers.
Official authority for the appointment of Lieutenant G. H. Currie as chief recruiting officer for Military District No. 7 for securing men for the Royal Canadian Engineers, has been received from Ottawa. The letter containing the official authorization from the adjutant-general in Ottawa to the G.O.C. in this military district says that "men are urgently needed for this purpose." Men can be recruited for the following branches of the R.C.E. service: Carpenters, bricklayers, masons, blacksmiths, tin smiths, painters, tunnellers, surveyors, miners, machinists and mechanics.

BIGAMY CASE BEING HEARD IN POLICE COURT

H. D. NASON, RETURNED SOLDIER, ACCUSED

Married a Devon Girl While Wife was Living in Maine —Claims He Had Been Divorced.

Harold D. Nason, who is also known as David Nason, appeared in the police court here this afternoon on the charge of bigamy. The accused is a returned member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force and is in his present position largely by force of circumstances. Although a native of New Brunswick he resided for many years in the State of Maine and while there was married. At that time he made his home in Houlton. It is understood that he left his wife who instituted divorce proceedings in Maine. Nason was served with a notice of the action and entered no defense. He expected that the suit would go on and that a decree of divorce would be entered. His wife, however, after the preliminaries of the action did not proceed and the marriage was never annulled.

Second Marriage.
After serving overseas with the Canadian forces Nason returned and spent some time in this city and vicinity. In Devon he became acquainted with a young woman whom he married. He explains this second marriage by stating that he believed that he had been divorced in Maine, not having been informed that the action begun by his wife had been stopped.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

MET THIS MORNING TO HEAR REPORT ON VISIT

Report for Legislature will be Prepared—Experts May be Heard During the Session.

The special committee appointed by the Provincial Legislature at its last session to investigate the matter of vocational education met at the Parliament Building this morning and heard verbal reports from Mr. J. Roy Campbell, M.P.P., of St. John, and Mr. Fletcher Peacock, director of vocational training for New Brunswick, who visited a number of vocational schools in the United States last autumn and early in the winter. The committee will meet again this afternoon. The object of the meetings is to prepare a report which will be presented to the legislature in the session.

It is possible that an arrangement will be made whereby a number of experts in vocational education in Canada and the United States will be brought to Fredericton to address the members of the legislature on this important matter.

Those Present.
The members of the committee who were present were: Mr. Fred Campbell, M.P.P., chairman, Mr. Fletcher Peacock, secretary, Mr. G. H. King, M. P. P., Mr. J. Roy Campbell, M.P.P., Mr. A. M. Belding of St. John, and Mr. J. T. Jennings of Fredericton, and Rev. Father Tessier of St. Joseph's College.

Features Emphasized.
The schools visited by the delegation from the committee were located largely in Massachusetts, but Mr. Peacock also attended the National Conference on Industrial Education which was held at Philadelphia. The features of vocational education particularly noted were agricultural education, trade education and household science. Mr. Peacock expressed the opinion that agricultural education could not be given through a central college but by taking education to the country.
