OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

TO CAN GREENS.

Must be Blanched or Steamed to Re-
move Bitter Taste—Boiling Process
Requires Just Two Hours.

Wash and pick over the greens care-
fully, throwing away all old leaves
and hard stems and washing until no
more dirt or sand settles to the bot-
tom of the pan.

Greens must be blanched or steam-
ed to take out the bitter taste, im-
prove the flavor and shrink them so
more will go in a jar. To blanch the
greens, tie them up in a big square
of old muslin or cheesecloth and hang
them on a stick over a kettle or wash
boiler half full of boiling water. Then
steam for 15 minutes. If they get in
the hot water itself they are spoiled.
When they have steamed enough dip
the whole bag in cold water.

Pack the greens in hot, sterilized
jars and put 1 teaspoonful of salt on
top of each jar. Fill it up with boil-
ing water and put on the rubber and
the top, but do not screw the top
tight.

Set the jars on the wood or wire
rack that is fitted to the bottom of the
wash boiler, and let the boiling water
come at least an inch over the top of
the jars. When the water boils, look
at the clock and notice the time. Let
the greens boil for two hours and then
remove, setting them down on a
wooden rack or on hot wet clothes.

Screw the tops as tight as possible,
or if the jars with wire bale tops are
upside down, push down the snap.

Turn jars upside down and let stand
until cool. When cold rub off each jar,
label it, and wrap it in brown paper
or newspaper to keep the greens from
losing color.

A VICTORY DISH.

Soak half a pound of bread crumbs
in 1 pint of cold water. Mince very
fine half a pound of any kind of roast
or broiled meat with a little fat. Put
the bread in a napkin and press it in
order to extract all the water. Fry 1
tablespoon finely chopped onion in 2
ounces of butterine for two minutes;
add the bread, stirring with wooden
spoon until rather dry. Mix the bread
with minced meat, seasoning with a
little salt and pepper and juice of a
lemon, stirring constantly until very
hot, then add two eggs, one at a time.
Mix well and pour in a dish to cool.
When quite cool, take pieces the size
of an egg and roll in oval shapes, but
slightly flattened; dip in egg and bread
crumbs and fry in quarter of a pound
of lard or dripping made very hot.
Serve with a border of mashed pota-
toes or steamed rice garnished with
parsley.

bad after all!"

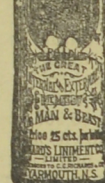
