## "PRIVATE BILL" WRITES OF TRIP ACROSS THE ATLANTIC

His Letters to "Dere Mabel" Attract Much Attention--Not Sea Sick, But is Able to Get Along With Less Food---The Port Holes Closed at Night to Prevent German Torpedoes From Landing on the Beds

"Private Bill" has gone over to France to get "Dere Mabel" a German helmet. And he's written her—indeed, a correspondent that he is—just how an American buck private feels when he's going across. The many individuals who have chuckled over "Dere Mabel—Love letters of a Rookie," written by Lieutenant Edward Streeter, a New Yorker, at Camp Wadsworth, will be delighted with the new letters from "Private Bill."

They appeared first in The Hatchet of the Transport Service of America, the daily newspaper published on the high seas by a joint board of army and navy officers for the boys going across. Copies of the third volume have just been received in New York, and "Letters to Mabel" has the place of honor on the first page of the second issue. "Private Bill" has suffered no sea change. Here is a part of his first letter.

Go in' Two Days  
"Dere Mabel: I take up my pen to write you. From the way I feel I don't think I'll be takin' things up much longer. I'm on a boat now. They say we are going to France but we been going two days now and I ain't seen no land yet. It seems kind of silly to write you cause I can't mail this till I get to France. It won't be no use then cause by the looks of things now I'll probably be flirtin' with a couple of mermaids in Davy Jones Lock Up long before that. That's a naughtical joke, though, Mabel. You wouldn't understand it.

"As far as I can find out their sending the whole army over on this ship. Most of them sleeps in the room with me from the noise. They got it fixed up cozy like an opium den or a morgue. They piled up three high, and the only thing that stops 'em there is the roof.

Don't Worry, Though  
"Were on a German boat, I bet it makes them sore Mabel to see one of there own boats bringing over fellows like me. The Germans is peculiar people. I ain't been really sick yet. I ain't give up hopes though. Angus McDonald, the Scotch fello, got so worried because he felt all right that he went up to see the doctor this morning.

"I guess we'll get blown up before we go much farther. I don't want you to worry though. I just menshun it.

"Yours to the last bubble,

"BILL."  
"They close all the windows every night, Mabel is told in the next letter. "Angus McDonald, the Scotch fello, says that's sos the Germans wont fire torpedoes through the windows and land on our beds. That's jokin way he has of speakin of the pieces of canvas we sleep on.

That's Me All Over  
"I ain't sick yet. I don't seem to need as much food as I used to, though."

The next day Bill sends a cable to Mabel. It reads:

"Not feelin' well today so am sendin' this instead of writin. Ain't seasick Just something the matter with stum-mick. Angus McDonald, Scotch fello, says that's me all over, Mabel. I says it's all over with me. Bright and funny to the last. Eh, Mabel. Guess well all be sunk soon now. It'll be a change to have something going down."

The day after he is well enough to write a letter although he still sees little ahead except "sinking."

"Each fellow has a little blue padded straight jacket to wear while he is sinking," according to Bill. "There awful heavy. I guess there to keep us warm while were drownin. Joe Lomis says there to pull us down quick sos we dont suffer. The captain says today that when we sink all men gets into rowboats and the officers hangs onto rafts. Theres somethin wrong somewhere. I been lookin over the rowboats to see whats the matter with them.

Sheetiron Duds Next

"We all got issued tin hats before we left. I guess they'll give us sheet iron underclothes next. It takes a long time to wear a tin hat without hurtin yourself. If you move quick it slides down over your eyes and bursts you in the nose. That's why they charge in a walk I guess. They got muskito nettin inside so's it wont hurt your head. If you take that out it makes a good wash basin or mess kit.

"We been on four days now," Bill indites in the following epistle "I'm beginning to feel like the Ainschunt Mourner. We lie around on the floor of one of the lover piazzas all day and read books from the library. Most of 'em is about the lives of fellows whats dead. That aint right for a bunch what expects to be with em any minute. Once a day we go up on one of the upper piazzas to exercise. A fello might as well try to swing Indian clubs on the 5 o'clock subway. The only exercise you can do without knocking off the head of the fello next to you is eyes right and eyes left."

Ocean Awfulty Bumpy

In his next communication he informs Mable that "I feel the same way the Knights of Columbus must have felt when they was discovering North Amerika. Just sailing round in circles and wishin' they had never left N. Y. We're going through an awful bumpy part of the ocean now."

"Somebody's rockin the boat," Bill announces firmly next day. "It's been rollin round something awful all mornin'. While we was snoopin round we just discovered somethin awful. All the liferafts what the officers ride on when we sink is full of holes. The water would come right through. As soon as we find the fello whats rockin the boat we're going to tell the Captin.
