THE FAMOUS LYS SALIENT IS FAST GIVING AWAY

Pressure of the Allied Force is Beginning to Tell--Shells From Big Guns Are Making it Warm for the Enemy --- Huns South of the Somme Are Being Harassed by the Franco-American Artillery

Gradually the famous Lys salient in the region west of Armentiers is giving way under the pressure of the British. Again Field Marshal Haig's forces have compelled the enemy to seek ground to the eastward where he will be more secure from the shells of the big guns that for several weeks have been firing criss-cross over the entire salient, working havoc among the defenders of the insecure line.

Likewise the Germans are being given no rest by the Franco-British forces and south of the Somme and the French and Americans along the Vesle and the Americans in Lorraine also are harassing them by artillery fire and local attacks. Nowhere has the enemy had the better of the encounter.

Retirement in North

Over a front of four miles, between Bailleul and Vieux Berquin on the Lys sector, the British have forced back the Germans to a depth ranging from 1000 to 9,000 yards, taking in the manoeuvre the village of Outtersteen and four hundred prisoners. A little to the south along the Lys River near Merville, the British also have advanced their line, and still farther south between Arras and Albert, the Germans have been relieved, under pressure of further terrain near Bucquoy.

While as a whole the German line between the Somme and the Oise Rivers is still holding, notwithstanding the terrific pounding it is receiving

from the Allied guns, the British have drawn nearer the road leading from Chaumes to Roye between Chilly and Fransart, placing Roye in greater jeopardy by attacking north. At the same time to the south of Roye, over the four miles from between Beauvraignes and Canny-SurMatz, a violent artillery duel is raging between the French and the Germans. It is in this region that the French are endeavoring—and in their initial efforts they have met with considerable success—to carry forward their two-fold purpose of outflanking both Roye and Lassigny by a drive eastward in the direction of the road leading southeast ward from Roye to Noyon.

Along the Vesle River front where the Americans and French are holding the line against the Germans there has been considerable reciprocal artillery shelling but with the weight of gun powder and of shells resting with the Allied troops they gave the enemy two shells for one. An indication that the German line immediately in front of the French and Americans is thinly held is the fact that American patrols at various points have penetrated sectors up to the enemy's barbed wire and trenches without encountering infantrymen.

In Lorraine, where the Americans captured the village of Frapelle, near St. Die, Saturday morning they have pressed on and gained more ground, notwithstanding a heavy bombardment by the enemy.

BAD AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT NEAR NEW GLASGOW N. S.

Two Married Daughters of Mr. N. C. Scott, of St. John, Mrs. Warren Ogilvie and Mrs. F. C. Bonnell, the Victims—
Car Went Over a Twenty-foot Embankment on a Narrow Piece of Road, in Avoiding Collision with Another Auto.

New Glasgow, Aug. 18—As a result of a motoring accident on Saturday afternoon the seven passenger touring car of Warren Ogilvie, managing director of Eastern Hat and Cap Company Truro, lies on its side a twisted wreck twenty feet below the narrow country road at Chance Harbor, ten miles from New Glasgow, and the bodies of the beautiful wife of the owner and her sister Mrs. F. C. Bonnell of St. John, are awaiting burial from their late homes. Four other woman friends of Mrs. Ogilvie who were in the car at the time happily escaped serious injury. The chauffeur, though seriously cut and bruised was able to leave the hospital and tell his story at the inquest this afternoon.

The party left the Norfolk Hotel here after lunch on Saturday to go over the famous round trip to Little Harbour, Chance Harbor and Fisher's Grant, then home to Truro. A narrow winding country road leads from Little Harbour to Fisher's Grant both sides overgrown with bushes. At certain points the roadway has been cut from the solid hill with the sheer wall on one side and the sharp descent to the water on the other. It was at one of these spots with the added danger of a double curve that the party was met by the car of F. E. Notebart, chief engineer of the Acadia Coal Company, and driven by his chauffeur Thomas MacNaughton. The road at this place being exceedingly narrow and winding, is protected by warning signs. Both cars were travelling at moderate touring speed. It was just at the narrowest point that fate decreed that the two cars meet.

Car Skidded Over

The Ogilvie chauffeur pulled over to the extreme edge of the road and applied his emergency brakes. His car skidded and plunged into the ravine, front first, then turning over, the rear end striking Notebart's front guard as it left the road. Three of the ladies were thrown clear of the car, the other three and the chauffeur being pinned down. Mrs. Moxon, who escaped injury and the driver crawled from under the car. Mrs. Ogilvie was

instantly killed and Mrs. Bonnell lived only a few minutes.

The cars were only ten feet apart when Lance saw the Notebart car and he took the chance by swerving out, of going over the bank to crashing into the other. MacNaughton saw the Ogilvie car about fifty feet away and pulled as close as he could to the high bank in the time he had. The whole accident was that of a twelve foot road with each of the cars six feet, nine inches wide.

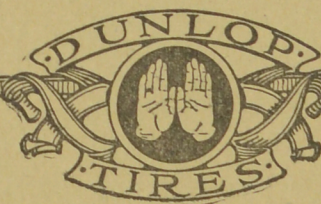
