HARICOT MUTTON.

Take a piece of mutton, the middle of the neck is the best to select, re move all skin and fat; boil some butter in a frying-pan, and place therein the chops, and fry them until they present a light brown color; arrange them the chops are with hutton onions.

A DUSTLESS MOP.

Make it yourself. Start with an old broom. Cut the straw off just below the wires which hold it to the handle. Cover this with an old stocking and sew on to this covering the legs of other old stockins cut about twelve inches long and slit into one inch strips up to inches of one end. Sew these around and around the surface in rows about one inch apart until the nop is of the desired thickness.

Then dip the mop into a solution of one-half cup of melted paraffin and one cup of kerosene, and allow the liquid o dry on the strips. The mop may be kept moist by rolling it tightly when not in use and covering it with a paper bag.

KLEANING KINKS.

Rub your nickel stove trimmings with whiting and kerosene and see how nice they look after polishing with dry cloth.

To clean brass, cut a lemon in half, the stains disappear. Then rinse in warm water and polish with a duster dipped in powdered whiting.

To clean linoleum, rub well with soap, then wipe off with a flannel floor cloth wrung out in hot water. Allow to get quite dry, then polish with any floor polish. After this treatment the linoleum will keep clean and bright for a long time.


