

INMATE OF MUNICIPAL HOME IN TROUBLE

EJECTED LAST NIGHT AND ARRESTED AS VAGRANT

Trouble at Institution Was to be Investigated, but Complainant Became Quite Abusive.

A young man who has been an inmate of the Municipal Home for some time past caused trouble in that institution last night which finally resulted in his being arrested and brought before the police court this morning. As an inmate of the Home the man gave trouble to the keeper being insubordinate and leaving and entering the building at any hour he saw fit. He refused to observe the rules and finally brought charges of ill-treatment and assault against Keeper McLennan. Last night, Ald. Robert Baxter, Chairman of the Municipal Home Committee of the City Council and Commissioner Thomas Niles, visited the Home to conduct an investigation. The man who was making the trouble refused to give information and used profane and abusive language and finally was ejected from the Home. Late at night he applied for admission to the institution but was told that he would have to produce a written order from the Chairman Ald. Baxter before he could be admitted. Later the man was found wandering about and was arrested as a vagrant.

Appearing in the police court this morning before Sitting Magistrate Dickson the young fellow was given a caution and was allowed to go. Some time ago this man was sent by the police to relatives at Ripples but he refused to stay with them.

Surface Drainage Lacking
The heavy rain yesterday afternoon showed at various places throughout the city the necessity for improvement in surface sewerage. At the corner of Brunswick and Carleton Streets two plugged catch-basins caused the street to be completely overflowed the water lying in places to a depth of more than a foot. At the corner of King and Carleton streets another blocked catch-basin caused overflowing of the street.

LT. A. PICKARD HAS ARRIVED IN N. Y. ON LEAVE

WENT OVERSEAS WITH ORIGINAL 26TH BATT'N

Will Arrive Here Shortly—Capt. R. N. Winslow with U. S. Army, is Now Overseas.

Lieut. Amos. Pickard of Fredericton who went overseas as a sergeant in the 26th Battalion has arrived in New York and was expected to arrive in Fredericton at noon today. He did not reach this city but is expected later. Lieut. Pickard is on leave for some time for the purpose of visiting his home here. This is his first leave he having been in the Canadian Expeditionary Force continuously since the organization of the 26th Battalion in the autumn of 1914. He was given a commission as lieutenant after long service as a non-commissioned officer, and qualified for his rank in England.

Overseas With U. S. Army
Relatives in Fredericton have received word from Capt. Robert N. Winslow who is with the Engineering Corps, United States Army, that he has gone overseas. Capt. Winslow is a son of the late E. Byron Winslow of Fredericton and a brother of Mr. J. J. F. Winslow of this city. The late Lieut. Jasper A. Winslow who died in France while in service with the Canadian Field Artillery was also a brother. Capt. Winslow after being graduated in civil engineering by the University of New Brunswick in 1906 went to the Southwestern States and became a citizen of the United States. Upward of a year ago he was appointed a lieutenant in the engineers and later was promoted. He trained with his unit at Battle Creek, Mich., and other places.

DESCRIPTION OF THE TUSSOCK IN ALL STAGES

DAMAGE NOW DONE FOR THIS YEAR IS SLIGHT

Caterpillars Now Forming Cocoons—Females Later Will Lay Eggs—Have Many Enemies.

A citizen who has made a close study of the Tussock moth and read extensively concerning it has given the Mail the following information on the subject:

We have heard and read much lately about the Tussock Moths or caterpillars and can see them now by the thousands in certain parts of our City as they are spinning their cocoons. The damage for this year is done and looking over the trees of Fredericton in a general way one would pronounce that damage nil. It is a bit disagreeable to have them crawling about the streets and houses but they will not bite you and will do you no harm.

Lepidoptera
This particular insect is known as the American white-marked tussock or tufted moth. What is an insect? It is an animal put together in two parts or sections, hence the name "in-sect". The outside of its body is hard and the inside soft. The body is divided into a head, a chest of three segments, each of which bears a pair of legs, and an abdomen of ten segments. Insects are arranged in orders, the principal basis of the classification being the form or structure of the wings. Some of the orders are: Nerve-winged or neuroptera, as dragon-flies and may-flies; straight-winged or orthoptera, as grasshoppers and crickets; half-winged or hemiptera, as bugs and plant-lice; sheath-winged or coleoptera, as beetles and weevils; scaly-winged or lipidoptera, as butterflies and moths; two-winged or diptera, as house-flies and mosquitoes and transparent-winged or hymenoptera, as bees, wasps, sawflies and ants.

Similar to Cut Worms
The order that our tufted nuisance belongs to contains also the many different kinds of cutworms found in our gardens and fields; the army worm (so-called from an occasional appearance in immense numbers when they devour nearly every particle of plant food in the course of their march); the silk-worm and the clothes moth and others too numerous to mention here. The members of this order have four wings covered with small overlapping scales, usually brightly colored, have a suctorial mouth and a complete metamorphosis through egg, caterpillar or larva, pupa or chrysalis, and imago or perfect insect. 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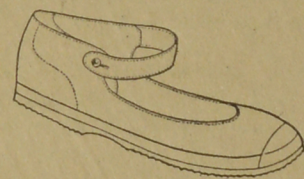
