## 10 YEARS FOR DELIBERATE DISOBEDIENCE

Ottawa, Aug. 19—The following statement was issued from the department of militia and defence: "Orders have been given in militia headquarters contain notices of the

## ENGLISH CHANNEL PORT IS NOW A SHIP HOSPITAL

### Craft Torpedoed by the Huns Are Taken There for Repairs --- Ships Reported Sunk Are Given a New Lease of Life --- Are Patched Up With the Aid of Divers and Sent to Dry Dock for Repairs

An English Channel Port, July 29—War has converted this port into a huge ship hospital. It is the haven of torpedoed, mined and disabled vessels and is equipped with the best ship "surgeons" and "nurses" in the United Kingdom.

Here ships the Hun had torpedoed and reported as sunk are given a new lease of life and sent out to sea again. It is estimated that hundreds of thousands of tons of shipping and tens of millions of dollars worth of cargo are saved as a result of the work of that part of the British Admiralty known as the salvage section.

Passing out to sea on one of the crack salvage boats the United Press correspondent observed more than a score of torpedoed transports and steamships. Most of them were British, but sprinkled here and there were a few American and Portuguese ships.

Some of them had been torpedoed twice. One formerly a German liner, taken over by the United States after war was declared, was torpedoed in the same spot twice. Another ship had been shot in two, but both parts were brought in by salvage boats, and eventually she will be sent to sea again.

Another ship which had a huge hole and fourteen other wounds made by splinter when the torpedo struck was undergoing repairs.

#### Divers Patch Ships

Two divers were at work alongside the boat. They signalled for the lowering of the "patch" and it was dropped to them. A "patch" is a number of wooden beams fastened together to cover the hole made by the torpedo. Pumps were set to work emptying the water-filled hold. When the ship was able to float she put out under her own steam to go to dry-dock for repairs.

Before the war six or seven salvage jobs at one time was a big task. To

day the salvage section is equipped to handle from sixty to sixty jobs at one time.

One ship in dry dock here, rescued as it was sinking is the American oil tanker O. B. Jennings of Bayonne, N. J.

In April the Jennings collided with a British tanker. Both were carrying oil cargoes and the impact from the collision set the oil on fire. Thirty-seven members of the crew of the British vessel were burned on board. Two others sought escape by diving overboard, but landed in a flaming oil covered sea, and were roasted. Only one aboard the Jennings was killed.

For several days the blaze was so fierce that salvage ships were unable to approach either ship. Finally they managed to beach the British ship. The smoke for a time prevented approach to the Jennings. When it finally cleared, the heat prevented approach. Finally destroyers were brought up and several score of shots fired into her. Forty holes were made in the hull, and she sank just far enough to put out the blaze. The Jennings was then beached, and the remainder of the oil removed by pumps. It is estimated the value of the cargo removed from the Jennings was \$10,000,000. The Jennings has been repaired, and now is ready for sea. The British vessel is still submerged, but she is expected to be floated soon. A cargo valued at \$1,000,000 is being removed from her.

## SUBMARINE REPORTED SUNK

Washington, Aug. 20—The navy department announced today that the captain of an American steamer had reported that his vessel rammed and probably sank a submarine about 9.30 p.m. on August 17, near Winterquarter Shoal, off the Virginia coast. The captain stated the submarine was struck on her port bow, bringing her alongside.

## DESTROY THE POTATO PLANT LOUSE

A bad outbreak of the Potato Plant Louse has been reported from the potato growing sections of the province. Spraying with Arsenate of Lead, Paris Green or Bordeaux will not control this pest. As this insect does not eat the leaves but drives its beak through the surface of the leaf and sucks the juices, causing the latter to curl and dry up, the only means of control is to apply a contact insecticide. "Black Leaf 40", "Nikoteen", (or one of the Nicotine sulphate solutions, Fish Oil or Whale Oil soaps, or Kerosene Emulsion will give good results if properly applied and will not injure the foliage.

#### Black Leaf 40.

Black Leaf 40, ½ pint; Hard soap dissolved in boiling water, 2 pounds, (liquid soap 1 qt.); Water, 40 gallons.

Black Leaf 40 may be safely added to Arsenate of Lead or Bordeaux, but if this is done the soap must be omitted.

#### Whale or Fish Oil Soap

Whale or Fish Oil soap 1 pound  
Water 5 gallons

The soap should be cut up into small pieces and dissolved in boiling water.

Dilute with cold water to the proper strength. Do not use with Bordeaux, Arsenate of lead, Paris Green, etc.

#### Kerosene Emulsion

Hard soap ½ pound (liquid soap ½ pint) Water one gallon Kerosene (Coal Oil) 2 gallons.

Cut soap into small pieces and dissolve in boiling water. The soap solution if then poured into the kerosene while hot and churned back and forth with a small spray pump until a creamy mass is formed and no free oil present. This takes from ten to fifteen minutes. The emulsion form is a stock solution which should be diluted at the rate of one part to nine parts of water. Do not mix this spray with other solutions.

In spraying with a contact insecticide it is necessary to hit the insects to get results. Top spraying will not control spiders or plant lice, as they feed on the under side of the leaves, consequently the nozzles must turn up in order to reach them. If the leaves of the plant are badly curled it will be impossible to reach the insects and spraying will be of little benefit.

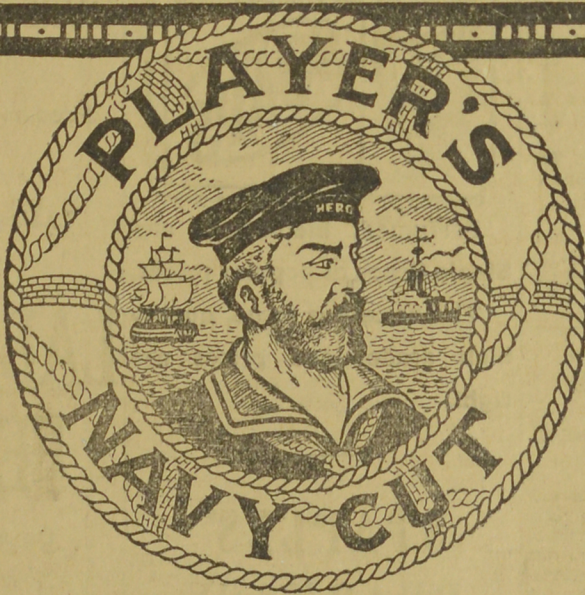
## CZECHO-SLOVAKS HAVE DESPERATE FIGHT TO FACE

Vladivostok, Aug. 16—General Dietrichs, the Commander of the Czechoslovak forces, in pointing out today the great odds his troops are facing estimated the enemy strength at forty thousand men with seventy guns and two hundred machine guns. The status of the Czechoslovaks in trans-Baikal is unknown, he said, but it certainly must be desperate. To attain the object sought by the entente allied governments, a substantial force must be sent to the Manchurian front.

Opinion on all sides appears to be that the allied governments are under estimating the magnitude of the task of liberating the Czechoslovaks and do not realize the necessity of actual warfare against superior numbers.
