

JOHN L. SULLIVAN WAS THE NOBLEST ROMAN OF THEM ALL

Was Undoubtedly the Greatest and Most Popular Fighter the Prize Ring Ever Knew--Was at One Time a Plumber's Helper--In His Day He Met and Defeated the Best Men England, America or Australia Could Produce.

All that was mortal of old John L. is gone, that which is immortal—his name—will live forever. Time, slowly receding, will only magnify with greater glory the thirteen letters that spell JOHN L. SULLIVAN.

He was the greatest figure of the prize ring—the most important character that ever climbed between the ropes. He was a real fighting man—if there ever was one, and has set the style for fighting men ever since. To John L., more than any other pugilist, is due the credit of altering

the style of ring fighting from the brutal bare-knuckle affairs in which wrestling was allowed, to the modern and present-day contests with padded gloves under the Marquis of Queensberry rules.

He rose from the position of a plumber's helper in 1878 into the championship of the world and a career full of popularity and adulation that has never been the lot of any other pugilist before or since. He made a million dollars—and he spent a million dollars! A long lifetime of incidents and adventures was crowded into that span of twelve years that Sully reigned o'er the ring. During those twelve years he set at defiance all the rules and regulations of nature. Few men even of stronger moral fibre than the "Boston Strong Boy" could have gone the pace that he did without disastrous results. But withal, he was big-hearted, generous, and good-natured, and absolutely "on the level." There never was the slightest taint of crookedness connected with any of his actions in or out of the ring.

In his day Sullivan met the best men that America, England and Australia had to put forward—with the exception of Peter Jackson and Frank Slavin. Peter was barred on account of his color; John L. would

never meet a negro. And what is more, he met most of those opponents with no greater preparation than a shave and shampoo; and it might be mentioned that on one or two occasions he was extremely lucky to escape defeat because of his careless condition.

Sully won almost all of his battles through his tremendous aggressiveness, rushing and driving his opponents before him with a storm of blows, until they sank to the canvas. Half of the men he met were whipped by his savage glare and man-eating style before they put up their hands. After frightening them half to death, his favorite trick was to pen them in a corner so they could not escape; beat down their guard with his left arm—club fashion, and then bring over his right like a bolt of lightning to their jaw. A little arithmetic by the referee was sure to follow.

John L. was the first to realize the facility with which a man could be jolted into insensibility by a sharp blow on the point of the jaw. This discovery made most of his fame, and incidentally revolutionized boxing.

After Sullivan won the championship, from Paddy Ryan, Feb. 7, 1882, he was managed by Billy Madden. Madden was aware of Sully's terrific hitting, and took him on a tour of the country, lasting about nine months, offering \$1,000 to any one who could stay four rounds with the champion. At the time this was considered a most audacious offer, but it proved a wonderful advertisement and made Sullivan famous, as he knocked out over fifty men on the trip. By the way, this tour netted him about \$105,000 in cash as well.

Later he toured England and Australia.

Sullivan lost his title to James J. Corbett in New Orleans, Sept. 7, 1892. The men fought for a purse of \$25,000 and a side bet of \$10,000. Sully lost in the twenty-first round, and after that time retired from the ring to the life of an actor, author and gentleman farmer. He lived the last years of his life in West Abington, the city of his birth—just outside of Boston.

After all has been said and done the greatest of his many victories was his victory over himself. John led a wild and merry life during his heyday. He burned the candle at both ends and in the middle, and on one, or two occasions had almost rung death's doorbell. However, he managed to conquer his desire and put over the knockout wallop on Kid Boozie. Old John had not touched a drop during the last fourteen years. This was his hardest battle—and his greatest victory!

BEAVERBROOK'S NEW POSITION

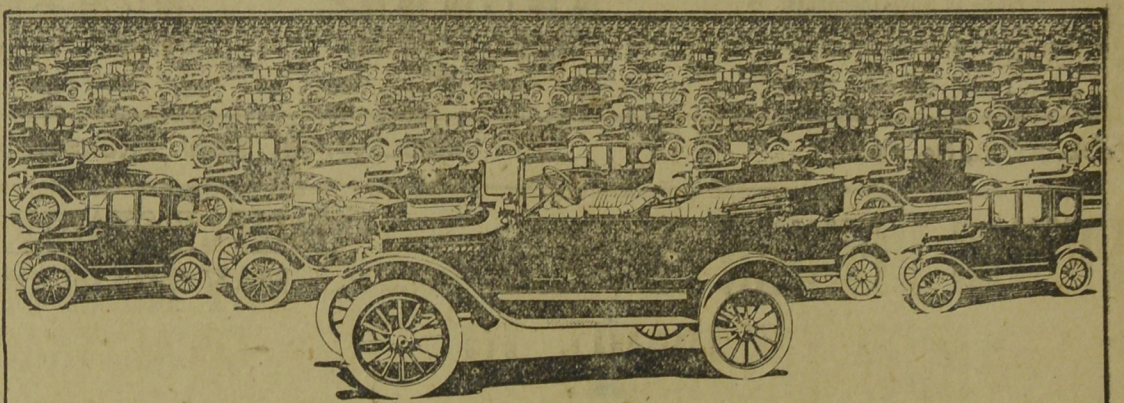
