## GREAT LESSON IN "DAMAGED GOODS"

The widely advertised seven-reel picture "Damaged Goods," which has probably drawn more criticism and commendation than any other film ever exhibited in America, opened an engagement in the Lyric Theatre yesterday afternoon to an assemblage of men which taxed the seating capacity of that house. At both showings last evening the theatre was again crowded, and the indications are that the picture will do a record breaking business during the period of its engagement.

As an amusement vehicle it is a failure; its theme is too sordid, its lesson too terrible. Those who go to see it expecting an exploitation of the salacious and the immoral will be disappointed; many pictures already shown here, and which have been counted as artistic successes, contained situations more suggestive, and are built upon stories more risqué. "Damaged Goods" is not suggestive; it leaves nothing to the imagination, but at the same time, the whole picture has an underlying moral so strong as to send those who see it away from the playhouse thinking more seriously than ever many of them thought before.

The story of "Damaged Goods" deals with a young man who takes his first drink at a bachelor supper, given in celebration of his coming marriage to a beautiful girl. While under the influence of liquor he yields to the persuasion of a friend and they visit a resort of vice. His false step is followed by direful consequences, but, unheeding the advice of a reputable physician and relying rather upon the false pretension of a quack, he goes through with the marriage ceremony with the girl of his choice. The result is that the fruit of the father's sin is visited upon his offspring.

It is not a pleasant story. It is not intended to be pleasant, but unfortunately, it is too often true, and it can be truthfully said that as an educator in a subject concerning which the present generation is woefully ignorant, "Damaged Goods" should be of invaluable benefit.

Good Seed is scarce. Place your order now with your County Councillor. The Department of Agriculture has ordered wheat and oats through the Seed Branch, Ottawa. The germination is carefully tested.

The Seed is now stored in the elevators at Quebec, thus avoiding transportation difficulties and guaranteeing delivery.

The Department requested the co-operation of the County Councillors in the distribution. Seed will be forwarded at their order in car lots, thus avoiding local freights and much handling.

Wheat will cost about \$3.00 per bushel in bags laid down.

The Seed Branch is yet unable to fix the price on oats. Definite prices will be stated in this space immediately they are at hand.

New Brunswick is expected to bread herself for the duration of the war. Every farmer should grow some wheat.

Agricultural Societies should arrange orders early. Send all orders to the County Councillors immediately.
