## MEDICAL MEN

Allied Surgery is the Triumph of the War-Nurses Work Unworried by Raids or Bombardments.

With the Americans in Picardy May 25—Germany's medical propa ganda, featured in the early days of the war, has been completely punc tured by the work of the American surgeons behind the lines in Picardy

Not only were many things claimed by the Boche as strictly German stolen from the surgeons of other na medical feats widely advertised from

The first hospital exclusively for desperate cases, operating as a field unit, is as American Medical Corps Hospital within range of the enemy guns in Picardy. Four American wo men nurses there probably are work ing closer to the front than any other women in the entire allied line. Un worried by air raids and bombard ments, their only concern-laughingly mentioned in one quarter—is that, 'the gas masks are too big for our noses.

#### Remarkable Operations

One example of the remarkable surgery now under way is that of giving a man a new chin and jaw. His entire chin was shot away. Five operations were necessary. First, the flesh of the neck and face were drawn together. This being extremely flexible, the deficiency was easily filled. A piece of bone was then taken from a rib and grafted into place as a substtute for the missing part of the jaw. False teeth were fitted to this, and the man now has a new and workable lower face.

Men whose lungs and intestines have been punctured are being saved daily by the most delicate operations Arms and legs are being saved which under the old methods would have been amputated at once.

The hospital is fitted nearly as completely as a base unit, including X-ray apparatus, steam heat and spotless operating rooms.

#### Physicians' Worst Enemy

The doctors' worst enemy in the fight to save lives is shock. Some men who have been wounded by high explosive shells are cold and semipulseless from shock when they arrive at the hospital. They are placed in bed and boxed in alow frame work crib. He is to recommend to the courts and to the mayor for clemency any persons confined or cared for where such action seems to him for the best interests of the community. His work is of course, to be conducted in a non-sectarian and non-denominational manner.

It is reported that the appointment has already justified itself. When Mr. Goodheart asked for six months leave of absence to go to France on behalf of the Denver Rotary Club a substitute was appointed to carry on his work till his return.
