### THE COMMODORE'S CAMOUFLAGE

Some newspapers are astonished at the attitude which the Chatham World has assumed with respect to the politicians who have been convicted of crooked work in connection with the patriotic potato transaction. The editor of the World is our old friend, Commodore Stewart, who sat in the Legislature from 1912 to 1916, and who more recently has been seeing things in the war zone and elsewhere. The worthy Commodore, when a member of the House, evidently had his suspicions of the patriotic potato transaction, and tried several times to have some light shed upon it, but always without success. On one occasion he put in an enquiry which was apparently ignored by the government, for the records of the House do not show that a reply to it was forthcoming. What the Commodore thought of the late government is shown by the following extract from a speech made on one occasion by Premier Clarke:

"Hon. Mr. Clarke said that, taking the hon. member (Stewart) at his own valuation, it was abundantly evident that the government had not been able to introduce this session much legislation which the hon. member considered was in the interests of the province, for no member of that House had done more to discredit the government and the party than he (Stewart) had done. He certainly could not be considered a supporter of the government, independent or otherwise, for to judge by his action, he was one of the most vindictive opponents the government had in the whole province."

The worthy Commodore, while a member of the House, hammered the government at every opportunity, yet when the next election came on he ran in Northumberland as one of its candidates and allowed the patriotic potato politicians to finance his campaign. Now he comes forward and tells the people that there was nothing wrong with the transactions which he formerly condemned, though sworn testimony can be quoted to show that things were about fifty times as bad as the Commodore and other critics of the old government ever supposed them to be.

A fine beginning has been made by Premier Foster and his government in cleansing the public life of this province, and the work must be finished. There must be no half-way measures.

President Wilson, in his reply to the German peace note certainly put it up straight to the Huns. The language he used was plain, but amply

justified and correctly voiced the sentiments of red-blooded Canadians as well as Americans. The Huns have been given to understand that if they want peace they can have it by surrendering unconditionally.

New York World: We shall confirm the reforms heralded from Berlin only as we make our military triumph complete. There must be a beaten army as well as a beaten government. The tyranny which yields at home must yield also in the field. By that sign the true interests of all peoples are to be vindicated. Even the nations that admit defeat are to conquer.

A Vienna despatch to the Frankfurter (Germany) Gazette, declares that the speedy, unconditional surrender of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy is probable. The indications are that if Germany decides to proceed with the war she will have to go it alone.

The Federal Parliament will, at its next session, follow the lead of New Brunswick by passing a bill creating a department of public health. Hon. J. A. Calder will likely be the minister in charge.

## HUN CALL FOR ABDICATION OF KAISER

Paris, Oct. 25—An enormous crowd assembled before the Reichstag building in Berlin calling for the abdication of Emperor Wilhelm and the formation of a republic, according to special despatch from Zurich L'Information Dr. Karl Liebknecht, the socialist leader, who had just been released from prison was applauded frantically. He was compelled to enter a carriage filled with flowers from which he made a speech declaring that the time of the people had arrived.

## TO INCREASE MARGINS

New York Oct. 24—New York banks were today advised by the Liberty Loan Committee to increase their margins on stock transaction from 50 to 10 per cent. This action was recommended by the money committee of the Liberty Loan Committee as an alternative to advancing money rates in order to conserve banking resources for financing of fourth Liberty loan payments.

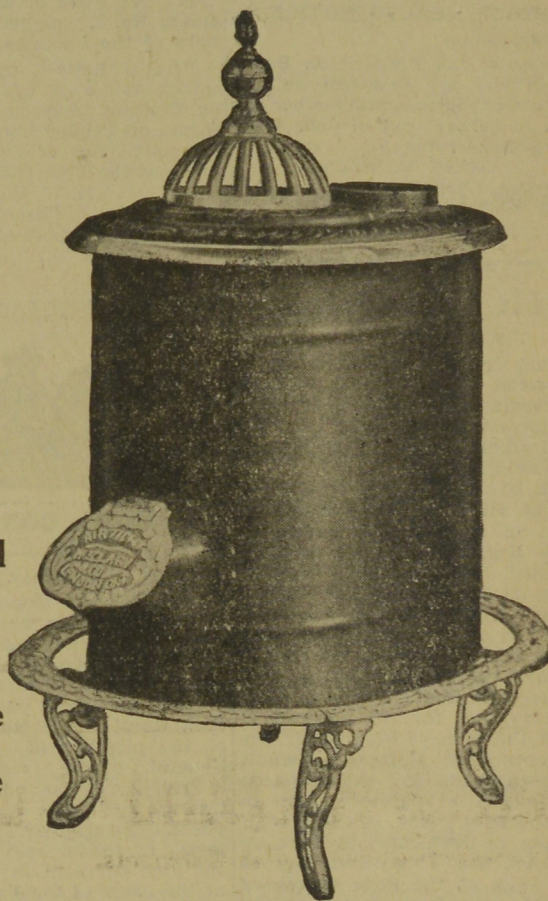

## EARLY CLOSING OF THE RAILWAY FREIGHT SHEDS

### CANADIAN GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS

Order of War Board Not to be Effective Until Nov. 10th.

The date fixed by the Canadian Railway War Board for the opening of the railway freight sheds for the receipt and delivery of freight at 7.30 a.m. daily, and their closing at 5.00 p.m. daily, excepting on Saturday, on which day they are to be closed at 1 p.m., has been extended under its direction from the 15th October to the 10th November.

The public is therefore advised that the regulations at present governing the opening and closing of freight sheds on the Canadian Government Railways will continue in force until the last named date.
