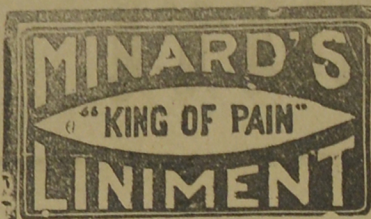

## EFFICIENCY CLUBS ARE DOING WELL

During 1917, "The Home Efficiency Clubs" of New Brunswick were organized, as a means of giving girls from ten to eighteen years of age, an opportunity to do their bit in Food Preservation. Last year, nearly 100 Clubs were formed, embracing 1700 girls. These reported 50,000 quarts of food canned, or otherwise preserved, and doubtless much was done that was not accounted for.

At the beginning of 1918, Miss Marjorie Flewelling was appointed Supervisor of the Girls' Clubs, and she has now over 200 live organizations of young people under her direction. During the winter months, the club members devoted their energies to Red Cross Sewing. During the summer, they will carry on an extensive Food Preservation Campaign.

Last year the Domestic Science Teachers of the Province volunteered to help in the work and gave three weeks of their vacation to the service free of charge.

This year, these Teachers will be employed by the Education Department to serve the Clubs, during the latter part of July and the first part of August.

To prepare for this, they will meet at the Normal School, Fredericton, from July 9 to 13, and take a short course in, methods of Food Preservation, Food Values, and Club activities generally. While here the itinerary of each teacher will be planned, and after the Convention, each will go directly to work among the girls in the various parts of the Province.

Those in charge hope to accomplish twice as much as was done last year.

## RUSSIA MAY YET GET BACK INTO THE WAR

Stockholm, June 12—The action of the Bolsheviks in putting Moscow under martial law is probably due to the uncovering of a plot which was brewing when I left Russia, which aimed at the overthrow of the Bolsheviks by simultaneous uprising in Moscow and Petrograd.

Prince Kropotkin, M. Avinkoff and a number of Cadet party leaders were in the plot. Plans for the formation of a Russian army of workmen and peasants were outlined to the United Press representative in a recent interview given by Gen. Parsky, formerly commander of the Russian forces at Riga, but now military chief of the Petrograd district.

"We are taking all measures possible for the defence of the country," he said, "inasmuch as Germany can break Brest peace treaty whenever she wishes. We have not yet fully developed a plan of training workmen and peasants, but in some places a tentative plan is in full operation. "Universal military service is impossible at present. When the people are fully reawakened and order has been reestablished, we hope to organize effective resistance and regain Russia's sovereignty."

The new "Red" army is worthless and everybody in Petrograd realizes this.

The return of Russia to the war is inevitable. Either this or Russia will become extinct. But before anything definite can be done, the Bolsheviks must go, according to the opinion of

## DAY OF SUCCESS FOR ALLIES ON FRENCH FRONT

London, June 13.—The military correspondent of the British wireless service writes from the front that yesterday was a day of success for the Allies. In the actual battle area the French by a counter attack drove the enemy back nearly two miles on a front of five miles, causing him further severe losses and capturing one thousand prisoners.

Immediately south of Noyon the French evacuated the salient around the Carlepoint in order to move on their own account to rectify their line. They administered a rebuff to the enemy, who attempted to advance, and drove him back to the high ground near the Oise river.

Australians and Americans.

Further north, in the Amiens sector, between the Somme and the Ancre rivers, the Australians once more advanced their lines at Morlancourt, south of the Ourcq river and north-west of Chateau-Thierry. The American troops have carried out a successful operation, taking Belleau wood and three hundred prisoners.

All these operations are evidence that the enemy, even though he is willing to accept enormous losses, cannot hope to inflict his will on the Allies unless he throws in his reserves in such large numbers as to give him a decisive numerical superiority. The fact that he has not yet thrown into this operation south of Noyon the bulk of the large reserves he now has available, would suggest that he still has plans to launch heavy blows on some other part of the front.

The Allies, although well satisfied with the manner in which their troops are dealing with the present danger, will be wise to avoid over-confidence until the Germans have shown how they intend to employ this large and still idle reserve.

ing of the state of affairs in Belgium. I only want to see my wife before she dies."

Mrs. Beland's Death.

Lieutenant Block did all in his power for Dr. Beland in this crisis, but all his efforts failed. Dr. Beland was not allowed to leave the prison or even attend the funeral. On no occasion did he receive any explanation of this wantonly cruel treatment, or any apology whatsoever from the military authorities at Berlin. On three or four occasions he was buoyed up by the prospect of an exchange or release to England, but on each occasion his hopes were dashed to the ground. When Ellison left, the military authorities in Berlin had granted him one or two small privileges, somewhat alleviating the monotony of his captivity.

Dr. Beland has not yet arrived in England.
