SUMMARY OF MORNING NEWS FROM BATTLEFRONT

Fierce Resistance of the Allied Forces have Checked the Enemy at all Points---Have Been Forced to Give Ground in Some Sections---The Allies Have Taken a Large Number of Prisoners and Many Guns.

The offensive movements of the Germans between Montdidier and Noyon and from south of the Oise River to the eastern fringe of the forest of Villers-Cotterets apparently are on the wane. In the former region the fierce resistance of the French and the Allied forces, for the time being at least, have checked the enemy at all points and on some sectors the Allies have even turned vigorously upon the foe and forced him to cede ground he had gained.

Only one attempt apparently was made by the enemy Thursday to better his positions near Montdidier. Here he launched a violent counter-attack from Courcelles to the north of Mery—a front of about a mile and a half—but was badly cut up by the fire of the Allied guns and forced to retreat leaving numerous dead and wounded on the field.

Likewise south of the Aisne the invaders are meeting with unexpected opposition and notwithstanding the large numbers of men they have thrown into the battle their gains have been relatively small. East of Soissons they penetrated to the village of Laversine, but were unable to advance on any of the sectors, although at one time north of Courcy French trenches were entered under the force of the impact. A counter-attack resulted in the trenches being recaptured almost immediately.

The sole result of the enemy's attack on the Montdidier-Noyon line up to the present is that he has by the violence of his attacks east of the Oise and the forced retreat of the French from the region west of the stream, blotted out the nasty Noyon

salient and brought the battlefront more into direct alignment with that beginning at the Aisne. And a terrible price has been paid for this rectification of the line.

Whether the Germans are prepared to offer huge sacrifices in bending back the other salients from the Aisne to Villers-Cotterets and bring the Picardy and Aisne battlefronts into a more continuous front remains to be seen.

In addition to the large number of prisoners taken by the Allied forces, ten cannon, four of them heavy weapons, and a large number of machine guns have fallen into their hands.

The German officers admit the losses of some German guns, but assert that the enemy has taken at least 150 Allied guns and more than 15,000 prisoners.

The Germans again have endeavored to force out the Americans from positions captured northwest of Chateau Thierry, but again met with defeat and the loss of numerous men. The attack was delivered between Boursches and the Bealleau Wood, but nowhere was the enemy able to gain his objectives.

American officers and men to the number of one hundred and eight fighting on the Toul sector have been awarded the French War Cross for bravery and fidelity.

In Macedonia the French troops have captured territory to a depth of nearly nine and a half miles over an eleven-mile front, occupied eleven villages and taken 310 of the enemy prisoner.

SIR ROBERT BORDEN HELD LONG CONFERENCE WITH GEN. CURRIE

London, June 13—Sir Robert Borden, accompanied by Hon Mr. Rowell attended another session of the war cabinet today. All the ministers attended the first meeting on Tuesday, but only two ministers from each Dominion will attend subsequent meetings. The Canadian premier yesterday had a long conference with General Currie, who came to London specially to meet him.

Sir Robert Borden also had an interview with General Smuts, and later saw Bishop Fallon.

The British House of Lords and the House of Commons are giving a parliamentary dinner to the overseas ministers in the Royal Galleries of the House of Lords next week. The guests will be received by the Lord Chancellor and the speaker. The of welcome will be delivered by premier Lloyd George.

GERMANS QUIT USE OF DOZEN

Amsterdam June 13—German housewives and trades people will shortly cease to use the "dozen" as a member of the family of weights and measures. It is the last surviving opponent of the metric system, which has now firmly established itself in Germany. Its official successor will be the "tenth."

The abolition of the dozen, it is pointed out, in a certain sense marks the elimination of English in many lines of business, inasmuch as this measure hailed from across the channel. With the introduction of purchase certificates, which limit the number of articles which shoppers are permitted to acquire under wartime restrictions, the habit of buying in lots of a dozen has practically ceased.

When normal conditions in all lines of business have been restored the public will have to acquaint itself with the new unit. The gross, or 12 dozen, measure will also disappear.

A DRIVE ON THE USE OF ENGLISH

Amsterdam, June 12—What the newspaper characterizes as "the filthy and treacherous Teutonic habit of speaking English instead of good, honest beautiful German" is condemned by the Cologne Volkszeitung, thus:—

"Thousands among us would rather tie their tongues into a knot over an 'Irish stew' than use the good German word 'gulasch.' Is it really indispensable that the English should teach us how to eat and drink!

"In our dwelling houses there are 'stores,' there is a 'dining-room,' we still encumber ourselves with 'shawls,' 'slips,' 'sweaters' and other fashionable things. The German young women know exactly what is 'fair' and what is 'shocking.' Her school friend addresses her as 'my dear,' and the honest German 'handedruck' is degraded into 'shake hands.'

"After parting it sounds so much more distinguished to say 'farewell' than 'lebewohl,' and on returning it is the correct thing to say 'how do you do?' in answer to which instantly comes the retort, 'very well,' which is supposed to be more cordial than our 'vorzueglich.'

"These lamentable lapses could be multiplied into the infinite, for there is not a single department of German life which they have not invaded. German people, pray, oh, pray do honor your own glorious German mother tongue and uproot the rapid English from your memory."

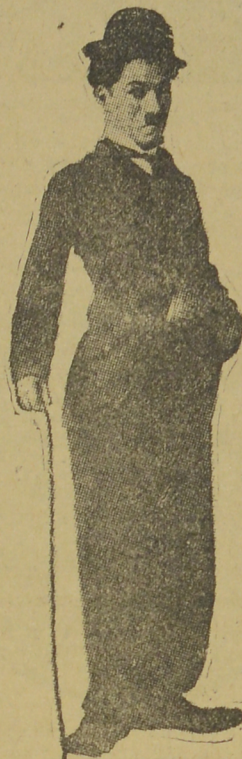
