#### THINGS TO MAKE WITH RHUBARB

##### Rhubarb Shortcake.

Use two cups of rhubarb, cut small,  
with cup of sugar in double boiler and  
cook until rhubarb is tender. Add  
juice and chopped rind of one lemon.  
Make a shortcake by any recipe; cut  
and bake it like biscuit. When done,  
break open, butter and arrange on a  
hot dish. Put rhubarb in between, and  
when serving pour juice over them.

##### Rhubarb Prune Sauce.

Wash cup of prunes well, then soak  
in hot water on stove where they  
will keep just below boiling point for  
two hours. Remove prunes, slip out  
stones and then put back in juice; add  
two cups peeled and finely cut rhu-  
barb, one cup sugar and cook in double  
boiler until rhubarb is tender.

##### Rhubarb Marmalade.

To each pound of rhubarb cut inch  
lengths, add one pound of sugar. Let  
stand over night. In the morning add  
juice and grated rind of one lemon to  
each three pounds of fruit. Let come  
to boil. Boil 30 minutes, then simmer  
about an hour, or until it is thick.

##### Rhubarb Pudding.

Mash half a pound or bag of puffed  
figs—or use dates or raisins or a mix-  
ture of all or of two of these fruits.  
Cover with boiling water and cook un-  
til water is nearly absorbed. Cut a  
pound of rhubarb into inch pieces, put  
a layer in buttered baking dish, sprin-  
kle with sugar, then put a layer of the  
cooked dried fruit and repeat until  
all is used. Add a quarter cup of hot  
water and bake in slow oven until the  
rhubarb is soft. Serve cold alone, or  
use cream.

##### USE "GREENS."

Pick over one-half peck of dande-  
lions and wash in several waters to  
remove grit. Steam over boiling water  
till tender. Chop finely and season  
with two tablespoons butterine, salt  
and pepper.

Beet tops, radish tops and other  
greens may be cooked in the same  
way. Not an inch of any sort of vege-  
table should be wasted.

##### CHOCOLATE TAPIOCA.

Make cocoa sweetened to taste as  
to drink. Scald in double boiler. To  
1 quart add half cup of granulated  
tapioca and cook 15 minutes. Eat hot  
or cold. If wanted cold, it will mold  
like jelly. Put the ordinary tapioca  
through a food chopper and you have  
the granulated article at one-tenth the  
cost.

##### TO POLISH A MIRROR.

To polish a mirror, use a dry cham-  
ois or pumice bag, or even tissue pa-  
per, and apply powdered chalk or  
whiting with any of these. Or use a  
dry cloth slightly moistened with a  
few drops of aqua ammonia.
