NIFTY STYLES IN CIVILIAN ATTIRE MUST GIVE WAY IN TIME OF WAR

The Economy Board, by Banning Cuffs on Trousers and Other Frills, Saves Cloth Enough for 900,000 Uniforms for Uncle Same Soldiers—The Country's Supply of Wool Must be Conserved, is the Order.

New York, April 27.—Men still in civilian clothes, whose suits are not absolutely plain and devoid of unnecessary embellishments this season, will not be dressed in accordance with the decree of the newest arbiter of fashion, the United States Commercial Economy Board.

Charles E. Wetzel, president of the National Association of Merchant Tailors of America, in an appeal to the tailors of this country, urging them to conserve the wool supply as much as possible, points out that "the Commercial Economy Board has unconsciously become an arbiter of fashion unprecedented in our history."

"The Commercial Economy Board and all kinds of coats and pockets, belts on all sack coats and overcoats except half-belts on ulsters, flaps on patch pockets on sack coats and from pockets on vests, peg top trousers, cloth belts on trousers, outside cash pockets on coats and all double-breasted sack coats and vests are some of the things that are to go as a result of the decree of the Commercial Economy Board.

Nifty Styles have passed. "The day for nifty styles— which were never advocated by the representative merchant tailors—has passed, and it behooves every man in this country who is desirous of helping the government in its conservation measures and who wishes to be well dressed, to see to it that only garments made along lines of the utmost simplicity are worn."

THE FOOLISH LETTER-WRITER. (Minneapolis Journal.)

Another exalted personage has now learned by bitter experience the folly of letter writing. A little more than a year ago, the youthful Karl, Emperor-King of Austria-Hungary, wrote what he must have considered a highly diplomatic letter to his brother-in-law, Prince Sixtus de Bourbon, where-in he talked about terms of peace with engaging frankness. Austria was then beginning to feel the war-weariness which now more and more oppresses her. Hoping to produce a diversion that would incline France toward a negotiated peace, the young kaiser wrote in the course of his letter to Prince Sixtus these words:

"I beg you to convey privately and unofficially to President Poincare that I will support, by every means and by exerting all my personal influence with my allies, France's just claims regarding Alsace-Lorraine."

The gnashing of teeth and rattling of sabres caused in Potsdam by the French government's publication of this remarkable letter must be left to the imagination. But the haste with which the unfortunate Karl sends official and zealous assurance to his kaiserly master that he and Austria are as ever "faithfully yours" shows that the revelation has caused great resentment.

"France's just claims" is a phrase difficult, if not impossible, to explain away. If Karl meant what he said, it involved unimaginable treachery to Germany and the All-Highest Wilhelm. There will come a day of reckoning, no doubt.

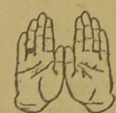

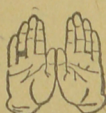
