SOLO WAS APPROPRIATE.

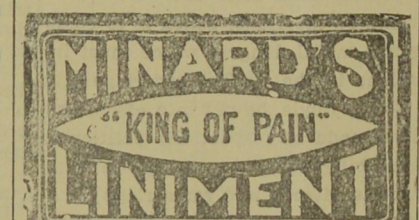
