WIN-THE-WAR RECIPES.

These recipes are issued by the
Fredericton Food Control Committee.

Fish Chowder.

1/4 lb. fat salt pork,
3 small onions,
3 lbs. codfish or haddock,
8 or 10 potatoes,
1 quart milk (scalded),
1 quart (approximately) hot
water.
8 small soda crackers,
Salt and pepper.

Try out pork, cut in pieces, fry
onions, sliced or cut in small pieces,
in fat, cook codfish or haddock slowly
for half an hour in water to cover.

The fish should be cooked without
the head, but having the skin left on.
Cut the potatoes in small pieces and
add them, with the onions, fat and
pork, which has been left in the pan,
to the water in which the fish was
cooked, having previously removed the
fish. Cook the potatoes half an hour
or until soft. Flake the fish or cut in
small pieces as desired, add to the
other ingredients in saucepan, then
add the milk, scalded, seasoning and
crackers. Serve at once.

2 cups sour milk,
1 cup flour,
1/2 cup sugar,
1 egg,
1 teaspoon soda (scant)

APPRECIATE ASSISTANCE FROM HOME

(Boston Transcript.)

"All your news was such good news,
particularly that which told of how
everyone is bucking up at home and
playing the game," writes a New Eng-
lander from his post of duty with the
American Expeditionary Force in
training in Southern France. "I have
read parts of your letter to some of
my friends here and their news is
about the same, and we are all think-
ing that it's 'the best ever' and hop-
ing it will keep up. A half-discourag-
ed army, discouraged by what it feels
is lack of appreciation at home—and
appreciation does not mean merely
giving balls and dinners to the sol-
diers at home either—is almost worse
than no army at all. Not that we
would not fight, anyway, but we can
fight a million times better if we know
that the people at home are apprecia-
tive and that they are working and
helping both for ourselves and for our
Allies and not sitting back and saying
'Why, the war will be over in the
spring, what's the use of meatless and
wheatless days?' . . . The fact that
people at home are preparing and are
willing to prepare and are doing it
practically voluntarily, warms us
through and through with love of
country and home, and we can go
at it with a feeling that everyone is
with us. You don't know how it
warms the heart and makes things
easier to have that feeling over here.
It has been snowing all day, though
now the moon is out and it is clear-
ing off for a fine day tomorrow. We
have had some cold weather here this
last week, hardly above freezing even
at midday, but not too cold at night
and usually fifteen above when get-
ting-up time comes around. The cold
is clear and sharp and not damp as
at home, or even as it would be if we
were with the regiment, so once the
blood gets started we do not feel it
very much except in the toes."
