

LIQUOR WAS STOLEN WHILE IN TRANSIT

SENT BY CHIEF INSPECTOR
TO BE USED FOR "FLU"

C. P. R. Investigating Officer
Looking Into Matter—Taken
Between City and
Burt's Corner.

Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson recently discovered that shipments of liquor made under his direction to Burt's Corner on two occasions have been tampered with en route and a portion of them stolen. Both shipments were made to Dr. O. E. Morehouse to be used in the treatment of cases of influenza.

On the first occasion Dr. Morehouse telephoned that the shipment had arrived minus one bottle. The Chief Inspector placed one shipment aboard the train in this city himself to make sure that it was intact at that time. This also was tampered with and part of the contents taken. One shipment was made by the afternoon train to Otis and the other by the morning train to Woodstock. Neither arrived intact.

The Chief Inspector reported this matter to the C. P. R. authorities and an investigating officer was sent to look into the matter.

Theft of portions of packages of liquor has become very common. For some time past it has been almost impossible to ship liquor without having it stolen.

BANQUET BY REFORM CLUB OF MONTREAL

HON. P. J. VENIOT IS
CONSIDERING INVITATION

"Good Roads" Campbell Asks
for Plans and Information
—Federal Assistance
for Great Roads.

Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works for New Brunswick, who is here on departmental business announced this morning that he believed that the Dominion Government was contemplating the granting of a sum of money for the Great Roads of the province. He bases his belief upon the fact that Mr. Campbell, Dominion Roads Commissioner, is now in touch with the Provincial Department of Public Works, and that Department will prepare plans and information to be forwarded to Ottawa.

Invited to Speak in Montreal

Hon. Mr. Veniot has received through Mr. Alphonse Decary, president of the Reform Club of Montreal an invitation to address that body at a banquet to be tendered him at a date to be determined by himself. Hon. Mr. Veniot now has the invitation under consideration. The Reform Club of Montreal is an organization which has had a long history and before which many prominent men have spoken.

Going to Carleton County

The Minister of Public Works will leave here Monday for Debec Junction, Carleton County, where he will address a Farmers' Convention on the subject "Good Roads in Relation to Development of the Farming Industry in New Brunswick."

Week-End Market

The week-end market consisted of a small number of country sleds this morning. Beef was the chief article of produce selling from 12 to 15 cents a pound. Chickens were few in number and sold for 35 cents a pound. Butter brought 55 cents a pound. Turnips sold for \$1.00 a barrel while potatoes brought \$3.00 a barrel. Hay was plentiful selling for \$15 to \$18 a ton.

Visiting in the City

Mr. Arthur Limerick of Maricopa, California, is spending a few days in the city as the guest of his brother Police Magistrate Limerick. Mr. Limerick is a South African veteran and was a member of the South African constabulary in the Transvaal for three years. He was well known as an athlete when he lived in this city, taking a prominent part in football and other sports.

LT. BELLIVEAU RELEASED AND NOW IN FRANCE

FOUR MONTHS PRISONER
OF WAR IN GERMANY

In Royal Air Force—His Machine Shot Down in August Last, Behind German Lines.

Professor A. Belliveau, of the Provincial Normal School received the glad news this morning that his son, Lieut. A. H. Belliveau was safe in France. The cablegram he received was dated Calais, December 27th.

In Royal Flying Corps

Lieut. Belliveau enlisted in the Royal Flying Corps and had been acting as a pilot for some months when he was reported missing on August 27, 1918. When last seen he was engaged in fighting a German patrol on the German side of the lines. He was shot down and being taken a prisoner was interned at Rastatt in Baden, Germany. A letter to his parents conveyed this information to them. He has two other brothers in khaki. Sergeant Edouard who was wounded a short time ago and Capt. (Rev.) Hector Belliveau who was Roman Catholic Chaplain to the Depot Battalion at Sussex.

Well Known Officer

Lieut. Belliveau was well known here and was very popular with his flying squad and his many friends will be greatly pleased to hear that he is at least in safety.

PUBLIC MAY NOT ATTEND SESSIONS OF COUNCIL

Dibblee, Secretary of the Fredericton Board of Health stated this morning that permission for the Municipal Council of York County to meet in annual session in this city opening January 7th is given. The same regulation will apply to the meeting of the City Council to be held during the same week. This is in accordance with the influenza ban.

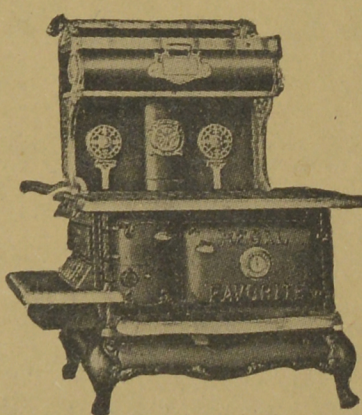

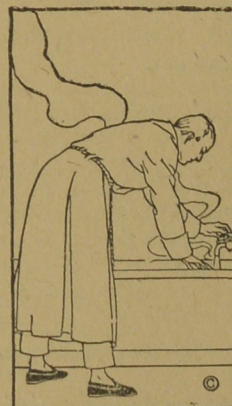
