

LEMON EXT. CASE HAS UNUSUAL FEATURES

DECISION WILL AFFECT SALE OF ALL EXTRACTS

Evidence of Prosecution Completed Yesterday—Magistrate Made Statement on Case.

The cases against David P. Clayton of this city for violation of the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 by the sale of a four ounce bottle of lemon extract was begun before Police Magistrate Limerick yesterday afternoon. The case is defended by J. F. Winslow appearing for the defence. P. J. Hughes is representing the liquor inspector. The case for the prosecution was completed. One of the witnesses was J. D. B. F. MacKenzie of Chatham official analyst.

During the progress of the case His Honor Police Magistrate Limerick said that the case presented an unusual feature in the fact that if he convicted the defendant of violating the Intoxicating Liquors Act by selling lemon extract not flavoring extracts of any kind could be sold in York County and even the manufacturers could be prosecuted for violating the act. The point to be decided is whether or not the extract is a drinkable liquid.

A Rare Bird

A soldier who left St. John without leave and tramped to Oromocto was taken in by the Military Police yesterday and brought to this city. He was conveyed to St. John this morning.

A Peculiar Situation

Owing to the fact that the Windsor Hotel, Dorchester, the only hostelry in the town has been closed, no sitting of the Circuit Court could be held at Dorchester this week. The pen at Dorchester is still doing business but it accommodates only permanent boarders.

Several New Troops Started

Mr. H. O. Eman, Maritime Secretary of the Boy Scouts' Association, was in the city yesterday. As a result of his visit several new Boy Scout troops will be started in this city. Two new scout masters Sergeant Major Tozer and Mr. Jackson will act as scout masters for the new troops.

Lt. J. C. Veness Wounded

Mr. H. G. Veness was notified this morning that his son Lieut. John C. Veness was wounded on October 21st Lieut. Veness remained on duty at the time. He was appointed to the 132nd North Shore Battalion in 1915. On going overseas he was transferred to a Machine Gun Corps. He has seen about three years' service.

Death of Child

The sympathy of the community is extended to Mr. and Mrs. Edward King of Charlotte Street, in the loss of their infant daughter Lillian May. The deceased child was eighteen months of age and is survived by her parents, two brothers and one sister. The funeral took place this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. J. J. Colter conducted the service.

Died in Hospital

The death occurred this morning at the Victoria Hospital after a lingering illness of Mrs. Robert H. Wandless of this city. The deceased was in her thirty-sixth year and is a daughter of the late Charles E. Collins. She is survived by her husband, two daughters, Gertrude and Marjory, and by one son Harry. She is also survived by her mother and three sisters. The funeral will take place Sunday afternoon at four o'clock, interment being made at Forest Hill Cemetery. Very Rev. Dean Neales will conduct the service.

Mrs. O. L. Barbour's Death

Mrs. Mary Helen Barbour wife of Mr. Otty L. Barbour, news editor of the Daily Telegraph, died at her home Rockland Road, St. John on Thursday after a brief illness. Mrs. Barbour was a daughter of the late Capt. W. A. Jamieson and for several years with her mother was a resident of this city. She was an active member of the King's Daughters and of the Missionary Society of Centenary Methodist Church, St. John. She is survived by her husband and mother to whom the sympathy of the community is extended.

BOARD OF TRADE EXECUTIVE HAD MUCH BUSINESS

ASKED TO CO-OPERATE AT GOV. GENERAL'S VISIT

Half-holiday for Letter Carriers—Employment Bureau Suggested for the City.

The meeting of the Board of Trade executive was held last evening. Pres. Mr. H. S. Campbell was in the chair. The first business discussed was a communication from the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. An invitation was extended by the Maritime Branch of the Association to the Fredericton Board of Trade to attend a conference to be held on December 11th at Amherst regarding problems of vital importance to the industrial development of Maritime Provinces. A resolution was passed expressing every sympathy with the movement and willingness to co-operate with the C. M. A. and asking for a copy of the resolutions the association may pass.

Do Not Favor Half Holiday

Regarding the communication concerning the matter of the half holiday for the letter carriers received from the Deputy Post Master General, Ottawa, the executive had no objection to the holiday on general principles but objected to the curtailment of mail delivery on any day except Sunday owing to the inconvenience caused to the public both from a business as well as a social standpoint.

In regard to the communication received from the Commercial Intelligence Branch of the Department of Trade and Commerce a resolution was passed to accept the offer for an exhibition of moving pictures in Fredericton for December 6th. The arrangements and details were left to the publicity committee.

Governor General's Visit

Mayor Hanson asked the committee to take an active interest in the reception of the Duke of Devonshire which will occur on Tuesday, December 3rd. He also hoped that there would be no empty flag poles at the time of the proposed visit. On the occasion of the official visit of the Duke of Connaught the only criticism made was that there were many empty flag-poles. He stated that the honor shown would be a fitting one for the King's representative. He also laid special emphasis on the undesirability of the general public holding a false idea that there must be a depression in industry.

NEW TRIAL IS GRANTED IN CASE OF F. AKERLEY

SUPREME COURT GAVE JUDGMENT TODAY

Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Co. Appeal Enlarged Until February—Rickard Appeal Allowed.

The Appeal Court delivered judgment in three cases this morning.

In the case of Grant & Horne at the suit of Silas B. Gregg an action for negligence the plaintiff having been struck and injured by a motor car belonging to the defendant firm in the city of St. John, Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen read judgment in which he said Mr. Justice White concurred. Mr. Justice Grimmer read a judgment also concurring. A new trial was ordered the ground being that damages had been excessive, unless both parties within thirty days file a written consent reducing the verdict from \$800 to \$600. The action was tried before Mr. Justice Chandler at St. John last June. F. R. Taylor, K. C. appeared for the appellants, Daniel Mullin, K. C. for the respondent.

In the King vs. Frank Akerley a crown case reserved, a new trial was ordered. The Chief Justice delivered judgment and Mr. Justice Grimmer agreed. Chief Justice McKeown of the King's Bench delivered judgment concurring.

The defendant in this action was tried at Gagetown for rape and adultery. He was acquitted on the first but found guilty on the second.

Hon. J. P. Byrne K. C. attorney General appeared for the Crown and R. St. John Freeze and D. Mullin, K. C., for the defendant.

In the King vs. Armstrong ex parte Mayes Case, Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen delivered judgment refusing rule on an application to remove into this court an order of Judge Armstrong reversing an order of Judge Ritchie of the St. John City Court. Chief Justice McKeown and Mr. Justice Grimmer concurred. Chief Justice Hazen in delivering judgment stated that it was a singular proceeding on the part of the appellant to express dissatisfaction after his attorney had acted for him. No injustice had been done the appellant.

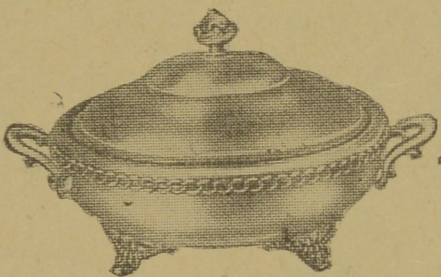

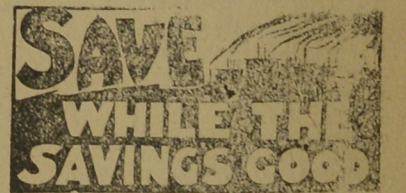
