NO STATEMENT OF LOSSES YET AT WASHINGTON

Washington, July 19.—Up to date no names of men killed or wounded in the present drive have been received by the War Department, and it is doubtful if any will arrive for the next few days at least.

War Department officers are of the opinion that the Americans naturally—because of the magnitude of the present operations—have lost a great many men in killed and wounded in the present drive. The country, we feel, therefore should be prepared to see very soon casualty lists much longer than those which have been made public to date.

Even if the names were on this side of the Atlantic, it is doubtful if they would be given out on a single day. Four years of war have established a very good ratio in casualties to the number of troops engaged. The publication of the entire list consequently might give valuable information to the enemy.

P. E. I. TELEPHONE EXTENSION TO NEW BRUNSWICK

(Charlottetown Guardian.)

Premier Arsenault is to be congratulated on having succeeded in getting extension of the telephone service between this province and New Brunswick. Several months ago he opened negotiations with the New Brunswick Telephone Company with a view to this extension. He also took up the matter with the Premier of New Brunswick. The other day he received from M. O. J. Fraser, General Superintendent of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, a letter stating that "the company had decided to do the necessary work on New Brunswick territory towards the establishment of telephone connection between Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, via Cape Tormentine and Cape Borden," and adding, "I am advised by Mr. Winfield that the Prince Edward Island Company is ready to do their share. We hope to have the service established not later than August 1st. This telephonic connection with New Brunswick will prove a great boon to the business interests of both provinces. Already we have telephone connection with Nova Scotia. Now with New Brunswick added we are joined up with the continent and may reasonably hope that ere long we shall be able to converse with our friends anywhere from the Atlantic to the Pacific."

SENTENCE IS COMMUTED
