The new senator is postmaster-general in the government and is now in charge of the department after more than a year's absence overseas

In fact the position of premier itself has been held twice by senators, once in the case of Sir John Abbott and Bowell.

Since 1911 the senate has had little representation in the cabinet. However, Sir James Lougheed, leader of the government in the senate, is now minister of civil re-establishment, and Senator Gideon Robertson is a minister without portfolio and may become minister of labor.

Senator Blondin is the only French-Canadian in the cabinet. He was defeated in the constituencies of Laurier-Outremont and Champlain on December 17 last, being nominated in his absence overseas.
