ination and choice is irrigated by the milk of human kindness, without which the best of parties cannot thrive. In short, Civil Service Reform, as we have it from the hands of Union Government, is not so intolerably perfect that the party government will abolish it. It is just good enough to last and to save the country a great deal of money—which is about as far as any practical reformer cares to go.

Cleared the Road

Union Government has cleared the road for the new parties by teaching the voter to think on all sides of the question before casting his vote. It has provided him with the means of escape from the old party shibboleths which meant nothing but factious discord and futile wrangling—much ado over Tweedledum and Tweedledee—the merry war of the Big Endians and the Little Endians, in which the plunderer always took his bit somewhere between. It has struck off his party shackles, and has made him more than he ever was before the master of his own fate, the captain of his own soul, a worthy adherent of one or other of the new parties, rooted in common sense, good business and genuine difference of opinion, which will be our harvest from the Great War.

Whatever comes out of the war our democracy is safe enough. Although Sir Robert Borden with an eye to standing in with the London crowd, with who he is now conferring made the Nickle motion on titles equivalent to a want-of-confidence motion in Union Government thus putting the title haters between love of their principles and their duty to a government that has done fairly well by the war, there is no doubt that the feeling of Parliament and of Canada at large is overwhelmingly against the creation of an aristocracy that will set up social banners and foment the class and mass jealousies which did so much to plunge Germany into war—class abuses, by the way, which England will speedily get rid of when the war is over, and which she would not seek to transplant overseas if she knew her Canada as well as we do.

Knighthood Not in Flower

Mr. Nickle was induced to withdraw the clause which inhabited the wife of a knight from calling herself "Lady"—an unfortunate concession on his part, because the ladyship part of his motion went to the very root of that defect in human nature, which renders a man strong enough to stand up against such baubles on his own account, weak enough to yield to the nagging of his bosom's spouse. As for hereditary titles, Sir Joseph Fleville and Lord Atholstan have put an end to them forever in this part of the world. Meanwhile democracy may rest content that knighthood can never again be in flower in this eager, nipping air, and that the war for democracy is not to be stultified by that threatened batch of four hundred. Suspended until September! Humph! Hanged for keeps! There is every reason to believe that the title-givers have had the fear of God and the people of Canada pretty well thrown into them, and that we have seen the last of this vicious nonsense. The King's birthday list is a good omen. It was indeed a famished scroll—only four new knights, and they all hangers from a previous roll of honor.

Don't trade your bonds at a cheap rate for horses, luxuries, town lots or other articles. These bonds are worth almost one hundred cents on the dollar, and any suggestion otherwise must come from some person who is trying to get the good thing into his own possession.

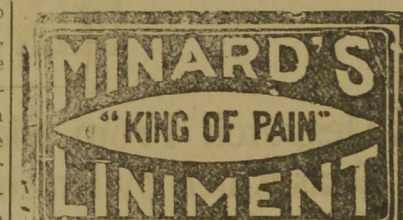
There is very little difference between War Loan bonds and bank notes. Any brokerage house will sell for you; any brokerage house will buy for you. Don't imagine there is any secrecy or mystery about these bonds almost everyone knows about them.

Keep them till maturity, and you will be providing yourself with a handsome present. You can't keep a good man down, and you can't keep bondsmen like these down.

You may possibly liquidate your old self, and reorganize into a new financial personality, through War Loan bonds. If you skimp and scrape to handle a thousand dollar subscription, and put it over, and having received the beautiful long green stuff, feel that it is good enough to hold, and having got yourself that far in hand, set to work to re-invest the interest in more War Loan bonds, or in the new 5½ per cent debentures issued by Ottawa, you may be far upon the road to independence.

The foolish virgins will be those who, having sated their curiosity by looking the lovely bonds over, give way to the reaction consequent upon the strain involved of putting (for the first time in their young lives) money into an absolutely gilt-edge investment, and who sell.

Hard-shell investors, who have been over the bumps, who have been drowned, and burned, and singed and almost annihilated before they learned investment sense, are not selling. They are holding. They will hold until maturity, or until those days when the war is a memory, when bigger Canada has doubled its store of wealth, and Government bonds are being issued to yield three and a half or four per cent. Perhaps you can imagine what the money price then will be for five or five and a half per cent bonds when new issues can be sold on a four per cent basis. You will never be stuffing up cracks in the attic with Canada's War Loan bonds.
