People Will Have a Pocket Interest in 'Good Government'

Canadians Likely to View Political Questions From a Different Standpoint When the War is Over --- Union Government Only a Jack-in-the-Pinch But it Has Exposed the Howness of Old Party Pretences--- Ancient Grudges and Prejudices May Disappear

Were do we go next? Who is my leader? What is my party after the war? These are the questions every thoughtful Canadian is asking himself today. If he is wise he will withdraw to a darkened room, introspect, retrospect and prospect until the confusion is sifted, and then emerge with a plain statement of the probabilities in his case.

It goes without saying that Union Government is a Jack-o-the-pinch, and a very good Jack-o-the-pinch it is. It will last the war out, and then, its chief function discharged, we shall revert back to party, because so long as human beings are different it is not reasonable to suppose that they will

all remain on one side. There is an affirmative and negative to every question, and when the common danger which now unites us disappears this salutary friction of ideas which makes for truth and progress will be resumed.

It will be resumed, as I take it, with greater understanding and keener interest on the part of the people than existed before. There will be real cleavages of opinion, and the people will be very much in earnest about them. The new political parties will be real parties, and not the old system of labels for Ins and Outs who whether they were in or out, were always standpatters. This is an incidental blessing of Union Government—that it has exposed the howness of the old party pretences and has taught people to canvass public questions on their merits, free of the ancient grudges of race, religion and unreasoning distrust of the other fellow because he happened to be on the other side of a sham fence, set up between Grit and Tory.

Under the new dispensation the old quarrels of race, church and language will tend to disappear, and we will quit raising hell, because it will take all our time to raise a revenue.

At the end of this year our national debt will be two billion dollars, to meet the interest on which, to pay pensions and to maintain the customary public services in a reasonable state of efficiency this country must some way or other find two hundred and fifty million dollars every year. To do this we must be able to put our whole mind on the subject, unhampered by the petty bickerings which have beclouded the real issues of happiness and prosperity for so many years. In other words, we are no longer in the middle ages, when man's soul occupied the largest part of his time, but in the first quarter of the twentieth century, when his material welfare is much more to the point. Democracy moves so rapidly these days that we must look sharp and think fast to keep up with it.

Will Look Sharp

It is a safe guess that we will look sharp, because most of us will have an acute pocket interest in good government at Ottawa. By the time the fifth Vivitory loan is collected the people of this country will have approximately a money stake of one billion three hundred million dollars in the credit of Canada, and well over one million investors will be looking

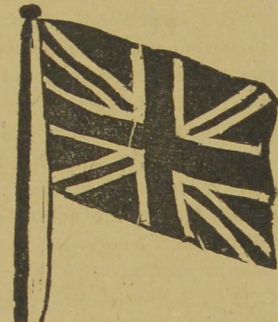
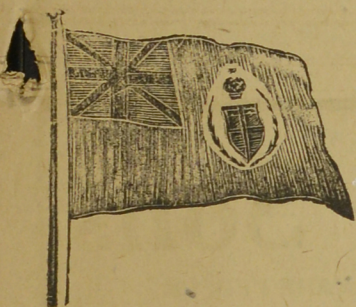

And to that extent he will know better and feel more keenly what the big fellows at Ottawa are doing with his little stake, because where the treasure is, there shall the heart be also.
