Get Them Right.

Every vegetable used for canning, dehydrating or storing should be in erfect condition. For satisfactory re sults it is necessary not only to have products which are absolutely free from decay, but to catch them at just the right stage of development.

Even if perfectly sound, over-ripe vegetables are not satisfactory for dergo a decided change in texture as they reach maturity and become fib ous or pithy. This not only detracts from their quality, but greatly increases the work of preparing them for canning or for drying and, later, for cooking.

One factor which makes for succes in saving for winter is to have all the products as freshly gathered as pos sible. Vegetables which have once been allowed to wilt are not nearly as good in the final analysis as those which are canned, dried or stored ab solutely fresh from the garden.
