

## FOOD INSPECTOR W. S. POTTS HERE OFFICIALLY

WILL DEVOTE ATTENTION  
TO BOARDING HOUSES

Licenses Required of Them—  
Picnics, Fairs, Socials, etc.  
Do Not Require Any  
License.

Mr. W. S. Potts of St. John, Food Inspector under the Canada Food Board, arrived here this morning and registered at the Barker House. Mr. Potts will remain in Fredericton until Friday night or possibly Saturday. His visit is for the purpose of inspecting the boarding houses of the city and having all observe the regulations with regard to taking out licenses.

### Regulations Changed

Inspector Potts has been advised by the Canada Food Board that it is not necessary to obtain a license to serve refreshments at lawn socials, bazaars, tea meetings, public or private luncheons, dinners, picnics, fairs, lodge, club or fraternal society meetings, and such functions, even where fifteen or more persons are present, but it is imperative that the Canada Food Board orders dealing with these entertainments be strictly observed.

Social and patriotic organizations are of course, expected to set an example in conserving as far as possible the supplies of wheat products, beef, veal, pork, cheese and butter and other foodstuffs needed for export overseas.

### Use of Sugar

Frosting is forbidden for pies and cakes and the manufacture of doughnuts and crullers is prohibited. Where 10 quarts of cream was formerly used to make a certain quantity of ice-cream the Food Board now limits the cream to 4 quarts, with 6 quarts of milk to complete the apportionment. Six pounds of sugar is permitted to 8 gallons of ice-cream. Fudge is strictly tabooed.

## ORGANIZE LOCALLY FOR CONSERVATION

CLASSES IN DOMESTIC  
SCIENCE FOR EVENINGS

Committee of Women to Can-  
vass City for Recruits for  
Classes—Many are  
Interested.

A large and representative gathering of the women of Fredericton who are interested in the conservation of foodstuffs so that the Allied forces will not want for wheat, met in the City Council Chamber on Tuesday evening. Mrs. R. FitzRandolph was in the chair and called the meeting to order by explaining the reason for calling the women together.

Dr. W. C. Kierstead, the food controller, spoke for about twenty minutes and was listened to attentively as he explained the needs of conserving food and using wheat substitutes and fish in larger quantities than at present.

### Series of Lessons

A series of lessons is to be given free in the Domestic Science Department of the High School during the first three weeks in July and the last three in August. A practical demonstrator from the Department of Agriculture will be present once a week and the work which she will do will be passed along at each succeeding meeting by a corps of demonstrators.

### Executive Organized

An efficient executive was organized, which will look after the work of arranging the classes and providing the materials which are free to those attending.

### Recruiting Campaign

A recruiting campaign is being carried on by an efficient committee of ladies who have divided the city into sections and will make a house-to-house canvass to interest the women in this work and invite them to attend. Already a great many have signified their intention of attending and are greatly enthused over the chance they are promised of learning the use of different substitutes for wheat and thus assisting in the great work of feeding our Allied forces.

### The Bank Merger

The shareholders of the Bank of British North America will meet in London next week to ratify the merger with the Bank of Montreal. It is expected that the matter will then be closed up.

## ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED FOR SHEEP IMPORTS

BANKS WILL RECEIVE  
ORDERS FROM FARMERS

Department of Agriculture will  
Expend \$50,000 — Down  
Breeds to be Imported  
This Fall.

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick announces that arrangements have been completed between his department and the secretary of the Bankers' Association, for the putting into effect of the provincial government's policy relative to the importation of sheep. Under the arrangement made any farmer can make application at any chartered bank in the province for stock which the Department of Agriculture will import in the autumn. Advertising matter outlining the system of importation and payment is being prepared and will be issued shortly. It is expected that all the orders for sheep will be received at the banks and forwarded to the Department of Agriculture at Fredericton by the middle of August. The stock will come in after that and will be distributed before winter. An appropriation of \$50,000 was provided for this importation by legislation passed last session.

### To Get the Town Breeds

Young sheep of the Down Breeds are to be imported as they are considered to be the most suitable for the New Brunswick climate. Oxfords and Shropshires will be the breeds. They are desirable from the viewpoint of both mutton-production and wool-growing. It is stated that they will endure the severe winter climate of this section of Canada.

### Aid From Associations

The Co-operative Wool Growers' Associations which were formed recently by the Live Stock section of the Agricultural Department have been of great assistance in stimulating sheep-raising. The prices obtained by the associations were high and the quality of the wool very good. There are sections of New Brunswick where there are very few sheep and it is to stock those sections that the importations are being made. The stock will come chiefly from Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and Quebec.
