Grandmother knew how to keep her kitchen supplied with home made soap by using left-over fats and greases Save the drippings, put them into a large kettle, cutting up a large potato into it to purify it. Let the fat cook slowly until all the water evaporates or until it stops sputtering. Strain through cheese cloth. Make a soda solution of one pound of pure caustic soda dissolved in five pints of water; the mass until smooth.
