A GREAT WORK IS BEFORE UNIVERSITIES OF CANADA

A Timely Word From Rev. Dr. Cutten, President of Acadia --- The Great War Has Vindicated the Universities, but Government Did Not Make the Best Use of Them.

Germany used her university professors while America was laughing at hers, hence German industrial supremacy. Germany will again use hers after the war in a new race for industrial victory, will Canada continue to laugh at hers?

The universities have been vindicated. We have heard in days gone by the criticism that university education did not amount to much because it was too ideal and not sufficiently practical. That may have been true, but when war was declared we found a situation where ideals counted. University halls were emptied and all university machinery was turned to war activity. Probably no class in the whole country enlisted in as large proportions as did college students. This is at it should be for ideals loomed large and all the young men, fired with enthusiasm and with enlarged vision could do they did.

Unfortunately in the rush and confusion of a new experience the government did not make the best use of this material. These trained young men were rushed into the ranks, and no advantage was taken of their training and ability. Many inevitably fought their way to commissions, but this was in spite of the system not on account of it. Note what the United States,

with an eye on our mistakes, has done her university men are formed into officer training corps, and are appointed to different branches of the service according to their university training. The universities are not simply robbed of their young men, but the universities themselves are made the training centres.

Well, that belongs to the dead past; if, however, we failed to mobilize our universities for war, don't let us make the same mistake in peace. Not only must our trained men come from the universities, but the solution of many of our problems must come from the same place. Every professor can become a direct as well as an indirect contributor to Canadian prosperity if his services are enlisted and his problem is set. This is especially true in the sciences of chemistry, physics, biology, geology, and psychology, but it is also true in other subjects. While we have been laughing at our professors in the past the laugh has really been on us, for we have neglected the most fertile source of new ideas the country possesses, and new ideas are needed in Canada today.

HENRY FORD GIVES OUT AN INTERVIEW

Henry Ford, still angry over the "heckling" to which he was subjected by United States Marshal McCarthy at the Lambs-Friars war fund frolic, has returned to Detroit.

"I am off charity for life," he told reporters before departing from New York. "After all, I do not believe that charity is what the people of America want, anyway. The soldiers who are coming back want a chance to get back into productive and remunerative employment."

"About 7,000 of my men are in the army and navy service and they will all have jobs when they come back. So, also, will as many other soldiers and sailors as can be used."

"See if the bankers and brokers—who make their money out of using other people's money and do no work themselves—will take their men back and make room for others in the same way."

Mr. Ford said that he had contributed \$500,000 to the United War Fund drive through the Detroit committee.

"If properly approached at the benefit performance at the Metropolitan Opera House I might have made an additional contribution," he said "But I was not going to be bull-ragged into doing so."

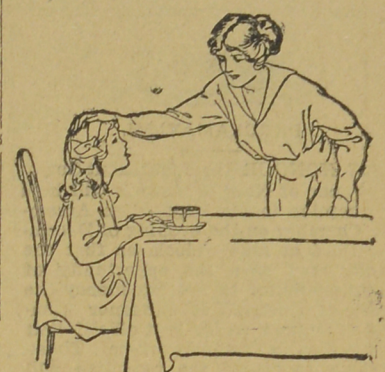
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said he was as ready to assist in this as he had been to "fight militarism."

As a "pacifist" he said, he had turned his factory over to the manufacture of weapons to end militarism and he now wanted to see that those who fought for freedom were properly dealt with.

Reporters, taking advantage of the opportunity to get his views on other problems growing out of the war, asked Mr. Ford if he were in favor of feeding the Germans.

His answer was a prompt "Yes." Otherwise we would be as bad as had been the Germans, he asserted.

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WORSE THAN THE FRENCH REVOLUTION

Archangel, Oct. 22—"Russia is fast bleeding to death through a reign of terror which is worse than that of the French Revolution, and it is time the nations of the earth came here to put down one of the world's greatest evils. President Nicholas Tchaikovsky of the Provisional Government of the north told a correspondent of The Associated Press today.

"It is no longer a question of politics," he continued, "inside the Bolshevik lines the situation is worse than the French Revolution; Victims executed now must be counted by the tens of thousands. All hair-splitting political reasons aside, the world must know that the Bolsheviks are no longer even a party, but are now merely a group of men determined to hold what they have seized by the merciless slaughter of those who oppose them."

"It is now only the question of putting down an evil. Persons escaping from Moscow, Petrograd and Vologda and reaching here bring indisputable stories of the executions. The situation seems beyond the control of some Bolshevik leaders who themselves are revolting at the bloodshed."

President Tchaikovsky said he recently cabled to President Wilson urging the immediate dispatch of more troops.

"Nothing can bring Russia out of this chaos until the Bolshevik terror has been quashed by the force of arms said Tchaikovsky. 'The force now here is unable to do this quickly. Meanwhile hundreds are dying daily.'

"The world must understand that Bolshevism, like imperialism, is a foe to democracy. It is in Russia a mere dictatorship a group of men holding sway by force of arms. They seize every straw, falsifying logic to justify themselves. As an example they now declare that the proposed league of nations is only another scheme to give power to the bourgeoisie against the working man."

"Perhaps the world will naturally ask what Russia is doing to help herself," said Tchaikovsky, "and I can only answer that we are doing our best. A recent example is the reorganization of the Government of the North. Now every party and every class is represented. Forgetting politics they are turning their efforts toward putting down the Bolshevik evil. We are mobilizing our forces, but the Allies must help."

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
