SERVED UNDER THREE
BISHOPS OF FREDERICTON

Interesting Recollections of

Mr. Thomas Wandless, who has been verger of Christchurch Cathedral for nearly forty years has handed in the resignation of that office. Mr. Wandless feels that on account of age he cannot cope with the manifold duties of the position.

He is in his 68th year and has rendered very faithful service in the position which he has held for so long a period.

Mr. Wandless was appointed verger while the late Bishop Medley was in charge of the diocese with the Rev. Mr. Alexander as Sub-Dean. Bishop Kingdom succeeded Bishop Medley having as Dean the late Rev. Dr. Partridge. After the death of Dean Partridge Rev. Charles Schofield now Bishop of Columbia occupied the position. Bishop Richardson, the present Bishop of Fredericton succeeded Bishop Kingdom after being coadjutor for some time with Very Rev. Dean Neales succeeding Rev. Dr. Schofield.

PROGRAM FOR RECEPTION TO HIS EXCELLENCY

OFFICIALLY CONFIRMED
BY PREMIER YESTERDAY

Address to Veterans at N. B.
Military Hospital New Fea-
ture—Dance After
Reception.

Mr. R. S. Barker, official secretary to His Honor the Lieut. Governor, waited upon Hon. W. E. Foster, premier of the province yesterday and presented to him the tentative program for the reception and entertainment of His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, Governor General in Fredericton on Tuesday next. As a result the program is announced as official today. An address by His Excellency to the inmates of the New Brunswick Military Hospital is a feature of the proceedings which had not been previously announced.

Guard of Honor

A guard of honor for the visit of the Governor General will be furnished by the Depot Battalion now in St. John and the band of that unit which was in Fredericton with the 236th MacLean Highlanders also will be present. Band and guard will come by rail, arriving Monday evening and returning Tuesday evening.

Dance Will Follow Reception

The reception at the Parliament Building Tuesday night will close at 11.15 and will be followed by a dance, ten numbers being furnished.

The Program

The official program is as follows: 9.30 A. M.—Arrive at Fredericton met at depot by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, Premier and members of the Executive Council and His Worship the Mayor with Committee of Council, (Guard of Honour.)

10 A. M.—Presented with civic welcome and address by His Worship the Mayor at Council Chamber at the City Hall.

10.30 A. M.—Students of the Provincial Normal School and children of the Public Schools addressed by His Excellency in the Opera House.

11 A. M.—Visit New Brunswick Military Hospital and Vocational School where His Excellency will speak to the Veterans and returned men.

11.45 A. M.—Visit Christ Church Cathedral, thence to Queen Hotel which is headquarters for His Excellency and staff during stay in Fredericton.

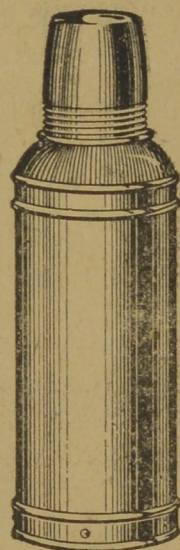
