COUNCIL IS RETURNED BY ACCLAMATION

Ald. A. W. Rockwell Retires—Mayor and Seven Aldermen Re-elected—Ward Boundaries.

No election will be necessary in the Town of Devon, the Town Council having been returned by acclamation. The new council nominated yesterday is as follows:

Mayor, Gilbert Henry, re-elected. Aldermen—Ward No. 1, H. H. Pickard, re-elected; A. J. McEvoy, re-elected; Ward No. 2, George Ward, re-elected; A. J. Bailey, re-elected; Ward No. 3, A. A. Colter, re-elected; W. Bruce Dayton, re-elected; Ward No. 4, R. A. Malloy, re-elected; E. J. Miles.

Ald-elect Miles is the only new member of the council, taking the place of ex-Ald. A. W. Rockwell who retires.

Ward Boundaries.

Ward No. 1 from the Nashwaak River to the upper Macklin line.

Ward No. 2, from the upper Macklin line to the Hughes line.

Ward No. 3, from the Hughes line to the Douglas parish line east of Union street.

Ward No. 4, from the Hughes line to the Douglas parish line west of Union street.

C. G. R. CLEARED AT MARYSVILLE LAST NIGHT

TRAFFIC IS RESTORED AFTER THE DERAILMENT

Heavy Run of Freight on Newcastle-Fredericton Branch—Present Bridge Not Efficient.

The line of the Newcastle-Fredericton Branch of the Canadian Government Railways which was blocked yesterday morning at Marysville by the derailment of several freight cars was cleared at 11.15 last night. Traffic has been restored. Prior to the line being cleared passengers were transferred around the wreck.

Heavy Run of Freight.

There has been a remarkably heavy run of freight on the Newcastle-Fredericton branch for some weeks and the accident yesterday emphasized that fact. Heavy trains with double-headed locomotives have been the rule during the winter and they have brought to the notice of the railway men in unmistakable fashion the necessity for a new railway bridge across the St. John River at this city. The existing structure will not bear a heavy locomotive of modern type with safety and will have to be replaced within a few years. It is not considered likely that a new bridge will be built until after the war but a new bridge must be built to take care of existing traffic to say nothing of the railway developments which are expected to take place in this section on both the C. G. R. and C. P. R. systems.

Future Development.

It is probable that Fredericton will be on a C. G. R. line which will connect via the St. John & Quebec Railway with railways in the State of Maine and take care of the freight traffic originating in the Maritime Provinces for United States points and vice versa, also that the C. P. R. will have a line running through this city via the Transcontinental and Moncton for fast overseas passenger and mail traffic. A double tracked bridge is a probability.

Bottles are Scarce.

Maple sugar makers report that they are experiencing some difficulty in securing a supply of bottles. Light colored beer and whisky bottles are largely used by honey makers, but the source of supply having been greatly curtailed by the prohibition act, it is very difficult now to procure them. Empty beer bottles which used to sell at 20 cents a dozen are now worth five cents each and the difference has been added to the price of the honey.

A number of important resolutions dealing with the administration and protection of forest lands were prepared for transmission to the government of New Brunswick.

Draft for Jewish Battalion.

A large draft of Jewish recruits from Cleveland, New York and Philadelphia passed through St. John yesterday on the way to Aldershot Camp, N. S., where training will be given the members of the draft preparatory to their going overseas to join the British Army. They will join the expeditionary force in Palestine.

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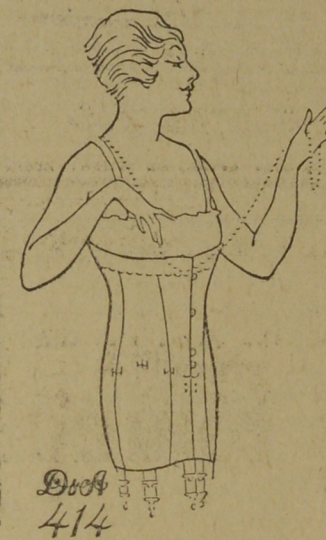
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
