NEW SPIRIT IS
IN EVIDENCE

Ottawa, June 6—The new spirit is evidenced in returns of registration of men in the 19 year old class. Latest totals now available show that in this class 46,128 men throughout the Dominion registered for military service. In these totals, Montreal heads the list with 8,795; Toronto is second with 8,234 and London third with 5,257. Owing to the difficulty of estimating the number of men liable to registration, it has not been possible to reach accurate per centage of the registration.

Other districts include: Quebec City, 2,543; Halifax, 1,516; St. John, N. B., 2,635; Charlottetown 675.

HUN OFFICER
TELLS OF FRENCH
RESISTANCE

London, June 5.—A letter written by a German officer and sent to the Morning Post by its war correspondent, gives evidence of the tenacity of the French resistance against the German offensive.

"I lie in a wheat field under a heavy gunfire, waiting for orders to attack," says the letter. "The day has been a hard one. We attacked and received much gun bullets from all sides, and our losses have been considerable. Today we are resting. How shall we be received there? I hope we will be soon relieved. I have only 50 men left and for days they have had no warm food nor slept. We shall certainly soon be relieved—at any rate from the first line; but I doubt whether we shall leave the field of battle. We have been in action for four days. Be thankful you are not here. If you only knew what we see you would appreciate your quiet existence. Our orders are 'prisoners and nothing else.' If you could only imagine what it means to take prisoners who defend themselves like madmen until you are only three yards from them."

the public works department and the extra material, rock and gravel will be used in widening the railway embankment and so shaping it that it

Other Work Being Done

New station houses along the line are being built by the contractor M. A. Condon, who is making splendid progress and the different stations and shelters will be ready when the road is completed. There are applications from other sections along the line between Gagetown and Fredericton and from Fredericton to Woodstock for additional sidings and shelters and one or two were authorized and built in Sunbury county during the past fall and winter. Another will be constructed at Camp road which is a favorite summer resort between Fredericton and Oromocto.

The concrete work at the Quarries Little River and Jones' Creek is completed. The Bedford Construction Company which has the work nearest to Gagetown has a considerable force of men on the job at the present time. They have been laying rip rap along the face of the Otnabog fill and very soon will be laying ballast upon the road and getting ready for the track-laying.

The formal notice of the company upon the Nova Scotia Construction Company calling upon it to exercise greater diligence in the construction of the road and for its completion within a certain time, will, said Mr. Carter, be served today.
