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A CANADIAN QUEEN.

This is a time when precedents and traditions are falling to the dust like broken gods, and the tour of Canada made by the Prince of Wales suggests in many of its aspects that the heir to the British throne is not immune from the new spirit, says a prominent Upper Canadian newspaper. There has been a good deal of speculation as to his matrimonial destiny, and it might not be surprising if His Highness went outside the accepted circles of royalty that hedge a king in search of a huen to share his throne. It seems almost certain that the Prince of Wales will not seek a wife from any of the European courts, and public opinion will endorse this. Blood connection between the rulers of the various European states is not an unmixed blessing, when one thinks of the German Kaiser as a grandson of Queen Victoria. Such complications are better avoided. Under these conditions, perhaps, the rumor that the Prince has set his mind on a Canadian Queen may not be entirely amiss. Certainly such a connection would achieve much in Empire building, emphasizing what the Prince himself has said, that the King stands in exactly the same relation to Canada that he does to England. At any rate, if the Prince has been able to travel from coast to coast of Canada impregnably, he must wear a coat of magic mail, for it is a feat that few young men of twentyfour could easily accomplish.

THE PRINCE A MAN.

The New York Herald, in commenting on the visit of the Prince of Wales to the United States, has this to say editorially concerning the royal visitor:

"It is foolish for anyone to talk of the Prince of Wales as a 'nice boy.' New York knows better than that by this time—at the close of two days' close observation. He is a man, thinks like a man, speaks like a man and acts like a man. What is more, in speaking he does not repeat himself—a rare virtue.

"Enthusiastic and impressionable women may exclaim rapturously: 'Isn't he cute!' or 'Isn't he a dear.' But it should be remembered that he is 25 years old, three years older than William Pitt the younger was when he became Premier of England; that he has had four years' active service in the war—wearing the Croix de Guerre, conferred by Marshal Foch for an individual act of gallantry—that he is a trained officer of the British navy; has put in more than a year at a university, speaks and writes three foreign languages and had for years as a tutor one of the most accomplished men in his line, outside George Meredith's 'Egoist.'

"If anyone had doubts as to where the speeches of the Prince of Wales came from, the question was settled on Tuesday. The newspaper men asked for his impressions after he had returned to the Renown. He sent for a secretary and dictated on the spot a long message to New York which was far better and more important than the speech which he made at the City Hall when he was made an honorary freeman of the city.

"A question arises—where did he get his qualities? Consider the family! George III was a reputed lunatic, with intervals of stubbornness; George IV a man of pleasure; William IV an amiable but rather silly old gentleman. But the Prince's great-grandmother, Queen Victoria, was the shrewdest woman, barring Queen Elizabeth, who ever sat on the throne of England, and understood our civil war when Gladstone was talking nonsense on the subject; his grandfather, Edward VII, though he had a German accent and was a poor public speaker, was the ablest diplomatist of his time, while the Prince's father, George V., had the courage when he returned from his colonial tour to make the speech, 'Wake up, England!' which caused Liberal politicians who rather favored getting rid of the overseas dominions, to sit up and take notice."

Miss Eva Booth, the talented daughter of the late General Booth, and head

of the Salvation Army in the United States, evidently wields a large influence in New York. She has been able to secure for the army the entire week's proceeds of the great Horse Show now being held at Madison Square Garden. She was made an honorary member of the Prince of Wales' reception committee, and the Prince insisted that she occupy, with him, an elevated box which had been erected especially for his use at the show.

VILLA'S MAN CAPTURED

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 21—Gen Felipe Angeles, chief lieutenant of Francisco Villa, and famous artillery expert captured last Wednesday by the Mexicans Federal forces under Gen. Gabino Olayo, near Valleoliva faced trial by court martial today in Chihuahua City, Mexico. The trial is considered by Mexican authorities as the most important held in that country during a decade of revolution and banditry.

Reports in circulation along the border today were to the effect that General Angeles would be accused of rebellion against his country and the death penalty would be asked. Many Carranza officials, were said to favor this disposition of the case as a warning to all rebel chieftains.

Some authorities in El Paso believed that the execution would be disastrous to the Carranza government in that the new revolutionary movement might follow. Villa sympathizers here today were outspoken in the opinion that the bandit leader would make some demonstration over the capture of chief lieutenant.

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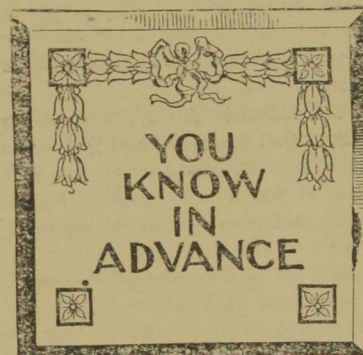
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
