U. N. B. "Con" Last Night Memorable Social Event

Hundreds Enjoyed Themselves Until Early Hour

This Morning—Resumption of Time-Honored Entertainment After the War Heartily Welcomed by All—Old Arts Building the Scene of a Brilliant Dance.

The Victory Conversation of the University of New Brunswick which followed the end of hostilities after this time-honored social function of the U. N. B. undergraduates had been omitted since the first of the war, took place last night in the Arts Building which has been the scene of numerous similar entertainments. The "con" of 1919 goes down in history as one of the most successful social events which ever graced the old halls of the Provincial University and is all the more memorable as marking the end of the war in which the sons of U. N. B. played their part nobly.

Guests at the "con" numbered upwards of two hundred including many from points outside Fredericton who came here for the occasion. These with a large number of undergraduates and members of the faculty crowded the old Arts building and thoroughly enjoyed themselves at an entertainment which was brilliant and pleasant.

Beautiful Decorations.

According to custom, the main entrance of the Arts building was closed and the west entrance was used by guests. The ladies' dressing room was

located in the Botany Laboratory on right of the entrance and gentlemen's dressing-room on the left in the English classroom. Dancing took place in the main hall which was decorated in red and black the university colors and which had as its principal feature the numerals of the senior class 1919 in flashing electric bulbs above the main entrance. Dancing also took place in the mathematical classroom on the right of the main hall which was decorated in the colors of the Freshman Class, purple and yellow. Opposite was the French classroom used for sitting out which was decorated in Sophomore colors, green and pink. The Classical classroom also off the main hall was used for the serving of the punch. In the upper hall the Junior class colors, green and white, prevailed in the decorations. In the university library on the third floor of the building small tables were set out for the serving of refreshment. For those who did not care to dance card-tables were placed in the Ladies' Reading room on the second floor and also in the Y. M. C. A. room adjoining. In the Ladies' Reading room the scheme of decoration was green shamrocks on a white ground.

The chaperones were all wives of the members of the faculty. They were Mesdames C. C. Jones, L. W. Bailey, C. S. McGinnis, C. E. Popplestone and Adam Cameron.

Fried Apples and Bacon.

Cut thick slices from fine large apples, leaving the skins on, but taking a little square out of each centre, to remove the core part. 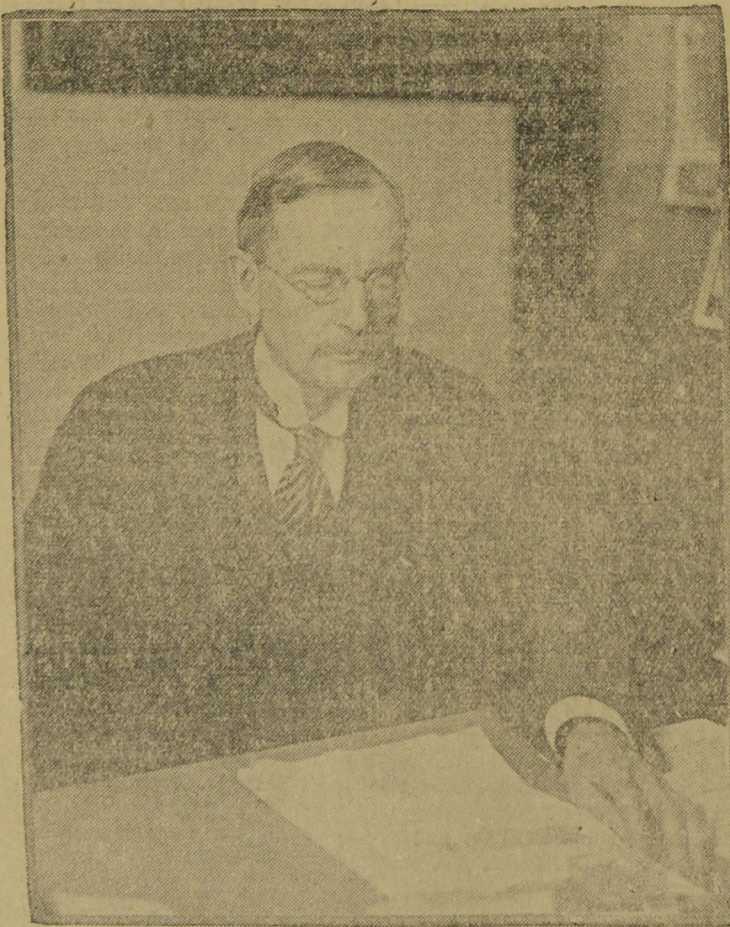

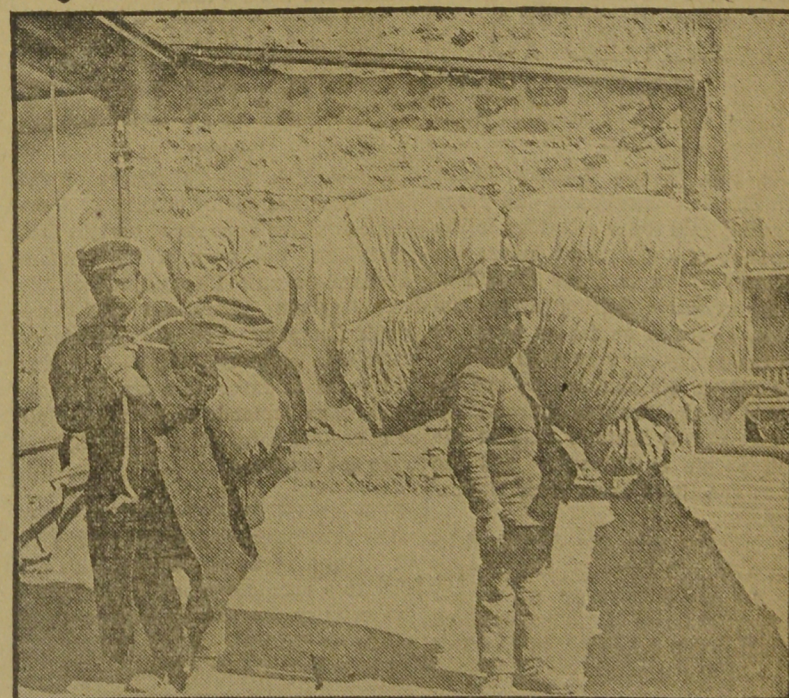
