NOTED FRENCH GENERAL VISITS HOUSE OF COMMONS

General Pau, a Veteran of the Franco-Prussian War, Given a Seat on the Floor of the House—Was Given Three Hearty Cheers by the Members—Quebec Member Attacks Prohibition—Nova Scotia Member Puts in a Word for Returned Soldiers.

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—The house today was favored with the presence of General Pau. As is usual with distinguished visitors, General Pau and the members of the French mission with him occupied seats on the floor immediately to the right of the speaker's chair. They came in just before adjournment while the debate on the address was still in progress. Curiously one of the French-speaking members from Quebec, Ethier, of Two Mountains, had the floor and he was launching forth an attack on prohibition.

The half-empty house rapidly filled as the distinguished soldier, wearing his simple service uniform, was escorted to his chair. On all sides, members immediately rose and gave three enthusiastic cheers. The general bowed an acknowledgement and Mr. Ethier paused in his attack on prohibition to make graceful reference to the visitor.

Then seizing the physiological moment, he continued in French to the high amusement of his French-speaking colleagues.

"Is it fitting," he asked, "that at this time we should thus annul the commercial treaty concluded between France and Canada? Is it fitting that at this stage that the importation of French wines should be stopped or even curtailed?"

Mr. Ethier did not pursue his argument. He adjourned the debate and the house being adjourned a moment later, members were in turn presented to the general.

Mr. Duff of Lunenburg

Following the tabling of a number of orders-in-council by the government and the appointment of several standing committees, the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne was resumed, the first speaker being William Duff, Liberal member for Lunenburg.

He said that amongst the many messages he had received from Nova Scotia asking him to convey congratulations to D. D. MacKenzie on being appointed house leader of the Liberals was the following:

"How sweet the name MacKenzie sounds

In every Liberal's ears,
It soothes his sorrows, heals his wounds,

And drives away his tears."

Mr. Duff referred to the provision for the returned soldier and said in this connection that the returned soldiers did not want to be objects of charity. So far as he could see all they desired was to take their places once more as Canadian citizens. He protested against the delay which occurred in discharging some of these men. Opportunities for getting positions were sometimes lost if a returned man was held up for three weeks or a month awaiting his discharge.

the bill granting to women the privilege of sitting in parliament. Nothing he said, could give him greater pleasure than to have one of the fair sex as his deskmate. In connection with the franchise, he described the method of marking the voters' list in Nova Scotia which he thought should be adopted for the dominion lists.

Of the department of public information Mr. Duff said that in the opinion of many this department was created merely to boost the government. The Canada registration act was useless expenditure of public money and a costly farce in the opinion of the member for Lunenburg.

W. F. Cockshutt of Brantford, who replied said that with the return of the soldiers from overseas parliament is confronted with problems, but there was great cause for thankfulness in the victory achieved.

Before concluding Mr. Cockshutt dealt briefly with the tariff question, saying that as he realized it as a contentious subject he would be very careful in his remarks.

When the minister of finance brought down his budget, Mr. Cockshutt said he thought its provisions with regard to the tariff would be satisfactory even to the member for Brome (Mr. McMaster).

LARGE WEEK-END MARKET

Eggs Sold for 55 Cents per Dozen in Small Quantities—Other Prices Unchanged.

The week-end market was quite largely attended this morning both by farmers and purchasers. The meat market stood about the same as last week. Beef sold for 12 to 15 cents a pound. Veal held the same price from 13 to 20 cents and pork sold for 22 and 23 cents a pound. Fowl sold for 35 cents a pound and chickens brought 40 cents. Eggs sold for 60 cents a dozen although a few purchasers obtained them for 55 cents. Vegetables were scarce this morning but what were on hand sold for the usual prices. Potatoes sold for from \$2.50 to \$3 a barrel, turnips sold for \$1 a barrel and carrots for \$1 a half barrel.

Wood and hay were plentiful the former bringing from \$6 to \$12 a cord while hay sold for \$16 to \$18 a ton.

HUN WORKMEN ARE ON STRIKE

Basel, Mar. 1.—Spartacan forces offered very feeble resistance to government troops when they took Harnburg on Thursday, and gave up two cannons, three thousand rifles and a quantity of munitions. At Essen the number of strikers is now estimated at 5,100. If the strike continues at Erfurt, there will be a strike by the Bourgeoisie as a protest against disorders.
