SEES NO HOPE OF LOWER PRICES

"While it is the belief that the general trend of prices during the next decade may be downward, I do not anticipate any sudden or violent tumble in the near future beyond the elimination of war prices made necessary to stimulate production in the high cost plants. We cannot eat our cake and have it. We cannot immediately have low-priced products with high-cost labor. At no time was honest labor more indispensable than during the war, and during that period the average weekly wage of all workers was greatly advanced.

"Out of the war has come a strong realization of the value of labor to civilization and we must accustom ourselves to the evident fact that a permanently higher scale of wages or compensation has been established by the world's worker, both skilled and unskilled.

"In all lines of industry, to make a fair profit, selling prices must be in proportion to the cost of production, including the enhanced cost of labor. This fact should be recognized in buying as well as in selling. There exists in the world today and there will exist for some time to come, a tremendous latent demand for goods and service, and a relative shortage of workers caused by the war. The high cost of living has not yet begun to recede, and it would be an erroneous policy at present to cut prices at the expense of labor."
