## PREPARING FOR THE NEXT VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN

New Minister of Finance Says He is Not Giving Much Thought to Securing a Seat in the House — Prime Minister Has Nothing to Announce in Regard to the Sessional Program—Sir Geo. Foster May be High Commissioner.

Ottawa, Aug. 24—Sir Henry Drayton and cannot possibly at the very best be in the house when it re-opens. The day of the "saw off" is apparently past and no party can possibly arrange any more for the uncontested return of a minister even in the "safe" constituency. Neither party can bind the farmer's organization, the labor or the Great War Veteran movements and the candidates of both parties will have to fight every inch of their way in future.

The trouble appears to be that neither party desires to lock horns with that of the farmers. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King will not be in the house when it reopens but he can afford to wait and there is much organization outside to which he can turn his attention. D. D. McKenzie will carry on the duties of house leader and Hon. W. S. Fielding will this session, be down on the front opposition benches to lend him aid. He will also attend the councils of the party. Altogether politics at the capital are in a condition of almost complete stagnation and even orders-in-council have gone out of fashion.

### Ratification Only Formal

The ratification of the peace treaty which might conceivably cause controversy will be largely a formal matter and it is not expected that many changes will be proposed or any made. A bill will be introduced providing for the temporary or permanent continuation of a certain number of war measures but most of the existing war measures will die the death because they are not popular. Prohibition will likely be introduced again but the fate of the bill is a foregone conclusion, and the reintroduction of a bill which failed to pass the senate last session is largely political. It is possible that a new minister of public works may be appointed to succeed Hon. F. B. Carvell but apart from that it is believed that the government's cabinet reconstruction programme has proceeded as far as it is going to proceed for the present.

The return of Sir George Perley to Canada led to the rumor, probably quite well founded at the time, that Sir George Foster would succeed to the position of high commissioner. Apart from the fact that Lady Foster is seriously ill, it is now believed that the government in the circumstances does not desire to create any further cabinet vacancies.

At one of the most acute periods in imperial and trade relations Sir George Perley is now holidaying around Ottawa and there is no Canadian high commissioner in London.

### One Acclamation Possible

An endeavor is being made to secure an acclamation for Hon. Dr. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, in Victoria. Success may crown that endeavor, but Sir Henry Drayton minister of finance, has as yet no place through which to reach the commons.

## NOWLAN GIVES HIMSELF UP TO THE SHERIFF

Moncton, Aug. 24—Albert Nowlan, the alleged slayer of Dominion Police Constable Joseph Richards at Roy, Kent County, on Friday morning of last week, voluntarily surrendered to Sheriff Boudreau at his father's home about midnight Saturday. Since the death of Richards, Nowlan has been sought by the authorities. When giving himself up Nowlan expressed sorrow at the death of Richards, adding, "I hope people will not think that I had anything to do with it." He was taken to the county jail at Richibucto.

The coroner's inquest into the death of Richards will commence Tuesday at 10 o'clock at Buctouche, conducted by Coroner D. V. Landry, M. D. A jury was empanelled Friday and viewed the body, which was taken to Moncton Saturday and interred this afternoon under G. W. V. A. auspices.

The death of Richards is the sole topic of conversation in Buctouche and vicinity. Considerable difference of opinion is expressed regarding the sad affair, many contend that the death of Richards was accidental, while others hold to the belief that he was murdered. An autopsy was conducted Friday night by Dr. Delaney of Buctouche who will give evidence at the inquest regarding the nature of the wounds on the body.

## BRITISH INCOMES CREASED BY THE GREAT WAR

London, Aug. 25.—Among the interesting information collated from appendices to the first volume of evidence in British income tax inquiry is the following:

In 1909 there were 7,000 incomes of between £5,000 and £10,000; now there are nearly 12,000.

In 1909 there were 126 incomes of between £50,000 and £75,000; now there are 221.

In 1909 there were 40 incomes of between £75,000 and £100,000; now there are 100.

In 1909 there were 65 incomes of £100,000 and more, in 1916 there were 98, in 1917 there were 105, in 1918 there were 124 and in 1919 there are 148.

In 1909 there were 11,000 incomes of and over £5,000. In 1919 there are fully 18,000. The year before the war the number was about 13,000.

In 1917 and 1918, the above mentioned incomes averaged practically £200,000 each, but ten years ago the 65 corresponding incomes averaged less than £160,000 each.

## BATHING WIDOWS HAVE ARRIVED AT ATLANTIC CITY

Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 23.—The "bathing widow" has just arrived. She is the newest sensation of the bathing beach here. Two demure blondes took the beach by storm when they appeared among the gay throngs of their short skirted and colorfully attired sisters, garbed in mourning costumes for beach wear.

Regulation crepe veils of black were pinned back from the sides of their tight fitting bathing caps and permitted to flow backward and down to the waist behind. The only relieving tone was a narrow edging of white around the bottom of the caps in front.

Their bathing attire otherwise was cut along the regular lines, the material being dull black. Black silk hose and pumps completed their outfits. The skirts were abbreviated just enough.

No, they did not go in the water, but they "knocked 'em dead" on the beach.

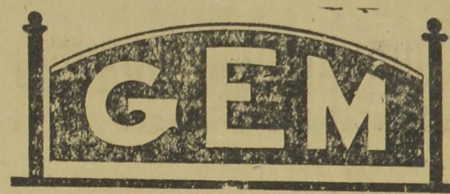
### Struck Ice Wagon

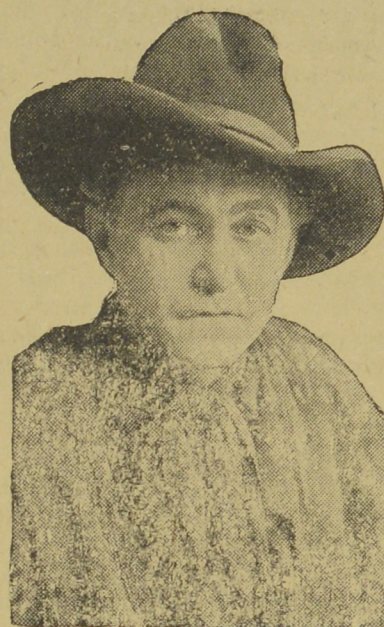
