

BICYCLE THIEF ROUNDED UP BY THE POLICE

STOLE A BICYCLE FROM
THE BOWLING ALLEYS

Had Removed All the Equip-
ment from the Wheel to
Disguise it From
the Police.

For some time past thefts have been reported to the local police and the stolen articles have been recovered without delay. The thefts have generally been petty ones but have greatly aroused the anger of those from whom they were taken. Several bicycles have been reported missing lately and one of these caused the police some trouble before it could be recognized and located.

On Wednesday last a youth from Minto entered the Palace bowling alleys and after loitering around the alleys for a short time left, taking another lad's bicycle with him. The lad missed the wheel and reported the theft to the police, who were unable for some days to locate it. Finally on Saturday last a youth was arrested with what was thought to be the wheel and was questioned sharply concerning it. He admitted the theft after a severe questioning and was locked up in a cell pending further investigation.

The lad was riding on a wheel when arrested which did not greatly resemble the missing one as it had no pump, handle grips, bell or tool pouch. He admitted taking the articles off the wheel to camouflage it and all the missing parts of the wheel were finally located.

LAST DAY FOR MUNICIPAL NOMINATIONS

RETURNS TONIGHT FROM
THE VARIOUS PARISHES

County Divided on Municipal
Home Project — Eastern
Part in Favor, Western
Against.

Today is the last day for nominations to be received in the Municipal elections and it is expected that all nominations will be in the hands of the secretary treasurer this evening. The project of establishing a municipal home for York County is expected to play an important part in the municipal elections campaign which have already begun and which will be completed with the elections on Monday, September 2nd. In the last session of the Provincial Legislature an act was passed under which a Municipal Home could be established with a farm in connection for the care of the poor by any portions of the county which desired but no steps have been taken toward the establishing of the same although it was thought that all portions of the county would unite. There seems to be an active division of the county on the question as to the wisdom of establishing the Municipal Home, the eastern part of the County being favorable to the idea while the western part of the county seems against it.

Stanley Parish

In Stanley Parish two candidates are already in the field, Judson F. Hinchey son of the late ex-Warden John Hinchey, of Parker's Ridge, and Stanley Norrad.

Prince William

In Prince William Coun. James King is expected to retire and ex-Warden William McMullen a seasoned veteran is re-entering municipal politics. Councillor Robert Graham is also in the field.

Dumfries

In Dumfries a three corner fight is going on, Coun. Hiram Manuel, and Coun. T. L. Brewer are in the field for re-election and Bert Simmons, son of ex-Coun. Thomas Simmons is a likely candidate. Here the municipal home project as well as other questions are likely to be disturbing factors in the re-election of Councillors Manuel or Brewer.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS WILL REOPEN TOMORROW

ATTENDANCE EXPECTED
REACH ABOUT 1,700

Permits Issued Number About
150—One New Teacher—
Supplies Will Be
Necessary.

The public schools opening will take place tomorrow and it is expected that there will be an attendance of about 1700 pupils which will exceed the attendance of last year. Up to noon today some 150 permits had been issued at the office of Mr. C. A. Sampson, Secretary of the Board of School Trustees. The number of permits will probably reach 200 before the close of today as a big rush of people wishing permits is coming in and Mr. Sampson is being kept very busy.

One New Teacher

Miss Agnes George will succeed Miss Jessie Clark at the Doak Settlement School and it is still undecided whether Mr. Roland Murray will accept the position of Manual Training Instructor at the High School in the place of Mr. B. B. Barnes who was appointed Manual Training Instructor to the Provincial Normal School on the resignation of Fletcher Peacock from his duties as Instructor there. Mr. Murray it is understood has been made an offer but has not been heard from yet regarding the same.

Supply Teachers Necessary

Two supply teachers are necessary in the prolonged absence of Miss Williamson of Smythe Street School who is at present in British Columbia and Miss Everett, Instructor of the primary department of the York Street School who has been detained in Great Britain by shipping delays three weeks longer than she expected.

Complaints Being Received

Complaints are being received at the local police station from all sides protesting against the furious driving of motor cycles on the city street. The police are looking sharply for the violators but as yet have not caught them in the act of violating the motor vehicle act which states that the utmost speed allowed to any vehicle on turning a corner is 6 miles an hour.

Returned From Motor Trip
