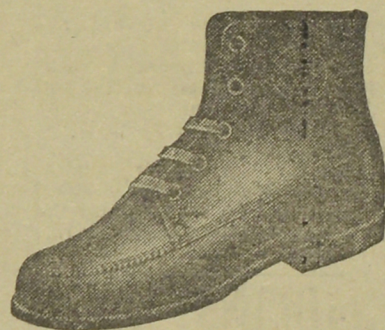

A BRIEF SUMMARY OF THE TREATY OF PEACE

Following is in brief the peace sit for goods for freight and passengers on land and in air. Allied shipping losses to be replaced ton for ton.

Territorial.
Alsace-Lorraine given back to France.

Saar Basin internationalized temporarily. Plebiscite to be held at end of 15 years.

Danzig a free port. A strip between Danzig and Poland to be internationalized.

Walloon speaking provinces to be given to Belgium.

Part of Upper Silesia, West Prussia, and Posen to be given to Poland.

Germany abandons all territorial claims outside of Europe.

Germany recognizes the independence of German-Austria, Czechoslovakia and Poland.

Plebiscites to be taken in Schleswig, the Bavarian Palatinate and East Prussia.

Germany abandons to the Allies all rights to her overseas possessions.

Germany abandons privileges and concessions in Morocco, Siam, China and Liberia.

Military.

Germany allowed an army of 100,000 men, including 4,000 officers.

No conscription in future in Germany.

All forts within thirty miles east of the Rhine to be razed.

Import and export of munitions prohibited; production limited.

Allied occupation to continue for the present, being reduced every three years if Germany fulfills her obligations.

German Great Headquarters staff abandoned and military organization curtailed.

Naval.

German fleet to be reduced to six battleships, six light cruisers and 12 torpedo boats.

No more German submarines.

Personnel of German fleet reduced to 15,000 men.

No forts to be built to control the Baltic.

Heligoland to be demolished by German labor at German expense.

Kiel Canal to be open to the merchant fleets of all nations.

Fourteen submarine cables to be surrendered by Germany.

The Air.

Military and naval airplanes and air forces prohibited.

Airdromes to be plowed up.

No Zeppelins to be retained.

One hundred seaplanes retained till October 1 to clear the seas of mines.

Political.

League of Nations instituted.

International labor organizations inaugurated.

Favored nation clauses existing before war to be rendered by Germany.

Brest-Litovsk treaties voided.

Allies retain right to get reparation for Russia.

British protectorate in Egypt recognized.

German prisoners to be repatriated.

Danube, Rhine and Moselle to be controlled by a commission.

Reparation.

First payment of \$5,000,000,000; total payments to be named by May 1, 1921.

Germany to have thirty years to make payments.

Germany to allow freedom of transit.

AROUND THE CITY

The depressions which exist in many of the asphalt sidewalks and form reservoirs for rain-water during and after each storm are relics of former days when householders and business people were allowed to have outside entrances to their cellars in the streets. Where there were plank sidewalks the cellar-doors closed flush with the walks and when closed formed part of them. On sidewalks of earth and gravel pedestrians had to "watch their step". There came a day when it was decided that Fredericton should do away with the outside cellar-entrances on streets and they were ordered filled in. Unfortunately the filling was done without adequate tamping and in the course of time the earth settled, with the result that the asphalt sidewalks settled too wherever a cellar-way had been.

The settling of earth brings to mind the possibility of raising earth by filling and that process has been resorted to all over Fredericton. Old-timers tell of Brunswick street being navigable in canoes in both spring and autumn and photographs of that street during the freshet of 1887 show it flooded to a depth of several feet. Brunswick street today is a number of feet higher than it was when first surveyed by the Royal Engineers who laid out town plat of Fredericton, and considerably higher than it was even in 1887. Filling material of various kinds has been used at various times. In former years when the city had a number of small tanneries the refuse tan-bark from the pits was used in large quantities to grade streets and fill depressions. Tan-bark had the disadvantage of being inflammable and often fire would get into tan-bark fillings and smoulder for weeks. Debris from burned buildings also was used in large quantities.

Another cause of settling in many parts of the city streets is the presence of old fire-tanks, relics of the days of steam fire engines which preceded the water-works, and before the steam-engines the hand engines which were worked by huge crews of men on large handles. These tanks were excavated to a depth calculated to let the suction of the engines reach the water at any season but in very dry summers many of them contained no water. The general extension of sewerage and surface drainage throughout the city would make it difficult to collect sufficient water by that method nowadays, to fight fire. The existence of the tanks is brought to mind in many places about the city by the subsiding of the asphalt sidewalks as the material used to fill the tanks gradually settles.

One of the chief reasons for thinking that the population of Fredericton is increasing is the fact that restaurants have increased in numbers to a marked extent recently. The presence of troops in the city during the war accounted for the fact to quite an extent and many residents prefer to eat at restaurants instead of preparing meals at home, but it also is recognized that there are more people in Fredericton, than there were a few years ago.

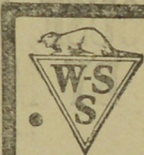
The fact that there has not been a very high freshet this spring recalls the fact that 1887 saw the record freshet on the St. John River. Large areas of Sunbury County and Queens Counties along the river were under water for several weeks and Fredericton streets were flooded. A permanent high water mark was carved in the sandstone of the fence of the Provincial Normal School grounds near Campbell street. Mr. James McGrath then working as stone cutter for the late Ald. John Moore placed a permanent record there after the freshet. At the time of that freshet, water from the river entered the basement of the City Hall, the boiler-room at the Pumping Station was flooded and the fires put out making it necessary for a steam fire-engine to do temporary duty supplying water to the citizens till the flood subsided, and the approach to the highway bridge was covered by water. With the building of the present steel bridge the approach was raised several feet.
