FASHION REVIVALS.

The women of Paris, it seems, are wearing filmy gowns cut so low that, in the words of the New York dealer who reports the fact, they are "going practically nude." English women, according to this observer, are adopting the style, and he predicts that it will become popular in this country. Great wars are commonly followed by fashion revivals which tend to relax the old conventions of propriety, and dealers in women's goods, not being moral censors, will probably not interfere in this instance to check the tendency. Fifth avenue shop windows no doubt will shine more refulgently than ever before, says the New York World, with gowns that are "dreams" of delight and indecorum. But the announcement having been formally made, it remains for the forces of moral reform to prepare to resist the invasion. They were latterly concerned, if our recollection serves us, with the corrupting influences of feminine lingerie, and there were fulminations from local pulpits and from Atlantic City club conventions against the degradation of women's dress. In view of the worst that it soon to some there must logically be a new and more aggressive resistance. It is a Wotan line that is now to be broken, and no guilty gown must be allowed to escape. Altogether, there is the promise of a lively winter of moral regulation of women's clothes. Parts may yield to the blandishments of the modiste, but Puritan America must be made to preserve the proprieties.

A SUCCESSFUL EXHIBITION.

The Provincial Exhibition which closed on Saturday evening was by long odds the greatest and most successful ever held in this city, which practically means that it was the best ever held in the province. The weather man was most considerate all through and this of course was a potent factor in swelling the attendance. The show was kept running for six full days and during that time was visited by more than forty thousand people, or an average of about seven thousand a day. In former years the big railways, by running special trains on stated days and offering cheap rates, helped materially to increase the attendance, but on this occasion they did not come to the front with any very liberal concessions. The people got here just the same, but a very large percentage of them did not find it necessary to depend on the railways. The Exhibition was a success in all departments and Manager Hooper and the energetic board of directors who acted with him are deserving of hearty congratulations. The reputation of Fredericton as the banner exhibition town of the Maritime Provinces, is firmly established.

Gold saved by a marine store dealer at Ramsgate, G. B., was discovered upon the removal to the workhouse infirmary of Charles Linton. The man had lived the life of a poverty-stricken hermit, and his unsuspected wealth created something of a sensation in the town. Lately he had been ill, and then had a fall. The police were called to his assistance and he was removed to hospital. On the way he cried, "Oh, my treasures! My beautiful treasures! They'll find my treasures!" A search was subsequently made and concealed beneath the floor of the man's abode a hoard of money, including nearly £200 in gold, was found. It is thought that other accumulations of wealth are hidden in the premises.

Blind and deprived of both hands, Sergt. Alan M. Nichols, of the Second Durham Light Inf., refused to be classed as an "unemployable" and today can write letters as proficiently as any normal stenographer. Nichols' restoration to a self-supporting basis was accomplished through patient training, a specially constructed typewriter, a pair of artificial aluminum hands, and his own indomitable spirit. Recently in English he passed a writing test of two hours and fifteen minutes, his "copy" requiring only two corrections.

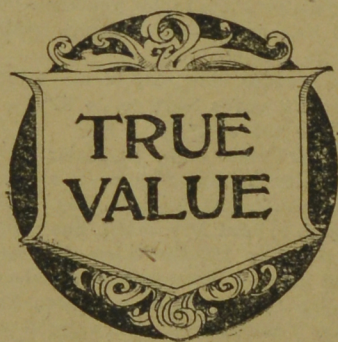
